

"DOGS OF WAR" GOING TO ALPS

Huskies From Alaska to Fight
Against Germans

ARE NOW ON WAY TO FRONT

Prize Team in the Frozen Fields
of the Far North — Will Haul
Cans and Supplies

Vancouver, Oct. 22.—One hundred and six of the husky dogs of the Far North, the animals which, in their native country, not only are man's best friend, but man's most useful companion, arrived at Seattle by the steamer Senator recently, and two days later they were shipped here en route to France. They are to be utilized in a variety of ways, but their training will fit them especially to the pulling of supplies, of machine guns, etc., over the winter snows in the Vosges.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer says:—"These are truly dogs of war."
"Sons of the wolf, their forefathers were bred by the Russian priests at the mouth of the Yukon and by the natives of Siberia, in an endeavor to produce a breed fitter to match the fury of Polar storms and the wild desolation of the ice fields that stretch in desert waste to the end of the earth."

A Long Battle

"Life with them has been one grand battle, in which none but the strongest survive. Work in Alpine Snows

"Now they are going to the scene of the world's greatest war to play their part, dragging supplies over Alpine snows, tugging machine guns into fastnesses that command the passes, diving beside their master as is the tradition of the breed."

"The Allan-Darling team has been the boast of Alaska. On the fleetness of their feet in the 412-mile sweepstakes thousands have been wagered. Persons of title and distinction have visited their kennels and admired the famous racers. "Lieut. R. R. Hunt, of the French army, went to Nome to buy the dogs. They were the property of Scotty A. A. Allan, of Nome, and Mrs. C. E. Darling, of Berkeley, Cal. "Scotty" Allan accompanies the dogs.

"Lieut. Hunt left the firing line to go after the Alaskan racers. He is to be promoted to a captaincy on his return to the color."

"The dogs for the most part are malamutes, but many of them are half-breed; that is, with a strain of malamute and the blood of some sturdy dog of the states. The half-breeds combine the characteristics of the malamute in that they can resist the cold and have the stamina of the hound, which is not indigenous to the north."

"The dogs were leached at pier 1 on Saturday, awaiting the arrival of the Canadian Pacific steamer for Vancouver, B. C., and attracted a curious and admiring crowd all day."

"Last night the dogs were loaded aboard the vessel with a couple of tons or so of dried fish, their principal ration; harness for every dog and six sleds. Great Racers.

"Hector, Tracy, Judge, Kid, Bob and Tom, are the veterans and the champions of the lot. These dogs have raced in seven or eight of the classic events between Nome and Canada."
