

HEALTH CENTRE IS EXPECTING A BUSY SEASON

**Governors Make Plans to
Raise Money to Purchase
Property**

The Saint John Health Centre is expecting a busy season with its accommodation made good use of throughout the day time and evening, it was reported at the meeting of the governing body held last night. Reports presented showed that contributions to the Lady Byng camp this season had just about equalled expenses and the camp had been most successfully conducted, benefiting all of the 44 delicate children under its care.

Plans were made for a vigorous campaign for life members in order that a payment on the purchase of the building might be made and a reduction in rental costs obtained in this way. Previous to the general meeting

of the governors the members of the ways and means committee met to plan for the annual tag day to be held on October 16. The funds of the Health Centre had reached the lowest ebb in the history of the institution as municipal grant payments were not yet forthcoming.

Dr. G. A. B. Addy, president was in the chair. John McKinnon, treasurer, reported only \$8.07 on hand, the municipal grant of \$2,000 for this year not having been paid, and last year's grant having been more than \$200 short.

Outstanding bills and salary charges would amount to \$1,028.75 by October 1, as the winter coal had to be paid for.

The ways and means committee's report was given by Mrs. T. N. Vincent, convenor, who told of progress in enrolling life members as a means of raising a fund to purchase the Health Centre building. The life members latest enrolled were Mrs. F. E. Williams, Dr. Mabel Harrington, James MacMurray and J. Lewis.

The Red Cross was granted a room for home nursing classes on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights, and the St. John Ambulance Association for classes on Tuesday and Thursday nights. Little Mothers' League classes were being formed and it was expected three at least would be in operation. It was expected that the Health Centre would be a busy place during the coming season.

British Airman Flies a Week And Wins Test

LONDON, Sept. 17.—Flight Lieutenant G. P. Bulman in a Hawker Cygnet airplane weighing 420 pounds, Friday won the endurance contest for light airplanes which has been in progress for a week.

Only three of the 16 starters finished the test, which included 1,994 miles of flying. The winner's fuel consumption was only 99 miles to a gallon and his speed averaged 65 miles an hour. His motor was rated at 34 horse power.

SPENDS LONG TIME COPYING PICTURE

Woman Started Work in National Gallery Before War; Still Unfinished

LONDON, Sept. 18.—Twice a week for nearly 70 years a woman artist has set up her easel in the National Gallery, Trafalgar Square, and devoted herself to "copying one of the largest and most famous pictures there—the 'Adoration of the Kings,' painted by the great Flemish master, Jan Gossaert de Maubeuge. She is Miss A. W. Guest, a little grey-haired woman, who among copyists, is one of the "oldest inhabitants" of the National Gallery.

Yesterday, as she stood before her nearly 6 ft. square canvas and carefully added a touch here to the resplendent gold coat of Melchio, and there to Baltazar's scarlet mantle, she told a reporter that to complete her picture was the greatest ambition.

She added:

"I began it when the original came here in 1912, but I had not got very far when the war came and the National Gallery was closed. I did not see it again until some time after the building had been declared and the Armistice had been reopened.

In a month or two I shall have passed the seventh year of actual working on the picture.

Didn't take Maubuse 12 years to paint the original?"

An official at the gallery said that the picture most often copied is Gainsborough's portrait of Mrs. Siddons.

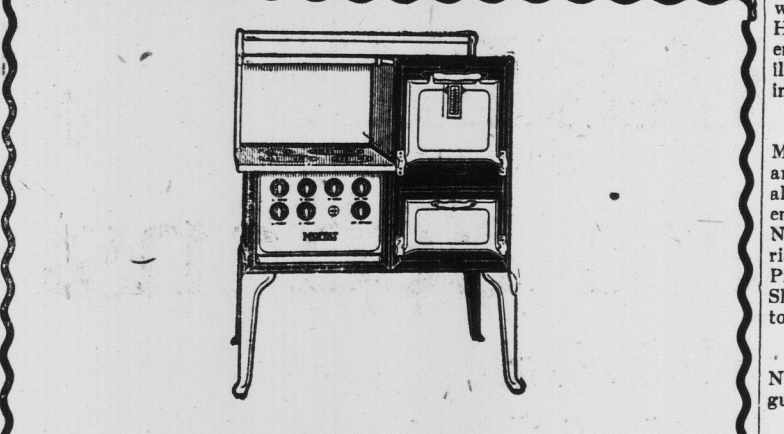

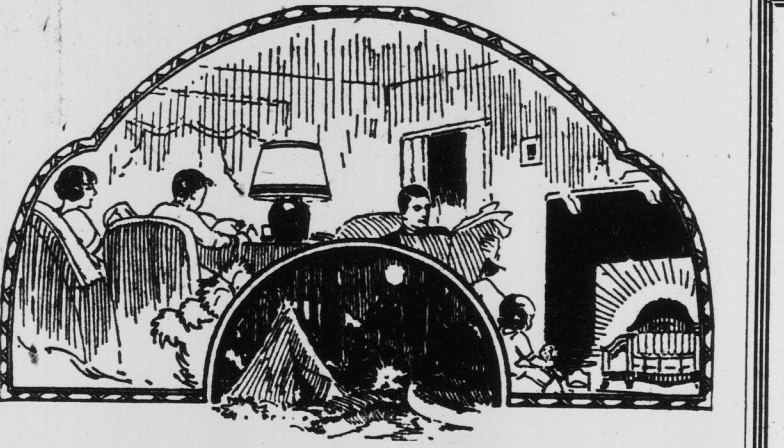

A circular issued to the local business men and others last week

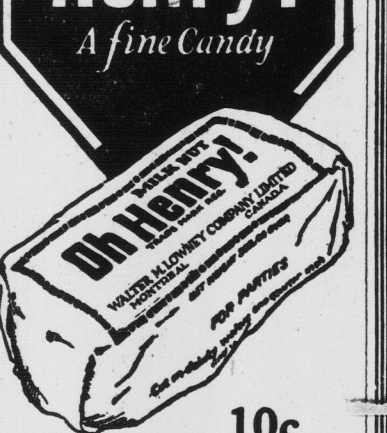
