NEWCASTLE LIQUOR CHARGE DISMISSED

Over-strength Beer Case Against Edward Dalton Thrown Out of Court

NEWCASTLE, Nov. 26.—The prohibition charge laid against Edward Dalton, proprietor of the Mismalchi hotel in Newcastle for having liquor in his possession unlawfully was dismissed by Magistrate Denery this morning. J. A. Creaghan represented Mr. Dalton. The case caused considerable interest in the town and was followed with great interest. A bottle of beer labelled not more than 2 per cent and returned from a provincial brewery in St. John to be sold according to government regulations was seized from the hotel by the local prohibition inspectors and when analyzed was found to contain more alcohol than was allowed by law. The charge was laid against Mr. Dalton who has a beer license. A. A. Davidson, crown prosecutor may appeal the case.

Twenty-one Days From Swansea—Snow Storms Included in Experiences

Buffeted continually by storm and rain for the last night because of the high wind and heavy sea the Canadian Leader of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, which docked at Long Wharf yesterday afternoon was twenty-one days out from Swansea, Wales.

The ship left Swansea on November 4 in the teeth of a westerly gale that blew continually during the voyage. Short of coal the ship was forced into Sydney, C. B. on November 20 to replenish bunkers. Two blinding snow storms were encountered on the trip across and several times blows heavier than usual forced the ship out of its course.
