RETIRE AFTER 47 YEARS IN CHURCH

Rev. W. J. Wilkinson, Who Entered Holy Orders in Saint John, Resigns Post

Word has been received in Saint John of the retirement from active parochial duties of Rev. W. J. Wilkinson, for the last 11 years Anglican rector of Kingsclear, York county, N. B. Mr. Wilkinson was ordained in 1879 in this city by the late Rt. Rev. Dr. John Medley, Bishop of Fredericton and Metropolitan of Canada, and the year following he was ordained priest by Bishop Medley at Christchurch Cathedral, Fredericton. Twenty-nine of the 47 years service devoted to the Church of England by the venerable clergyman have been spent as rector of Bay du Vin, Northumberland county. At one time he was curate at Fellicoodic. Charles Wilkinson of Richibucto, Moncton, formerly of Saint John, is a son.

PLAN FOR NEW INSPECTOR OBJECTED TO

R. B. Hanson, in Parliament, Says No Need For Official

The recent announcement that the post office department had decided to appoint a French and English-speaking inspector for the Maritime Provinces, with headquarters at Moncton, came before Parliament this week, in connection with the appointment of an additional inspector was expressed by R. B. Hanson (Conservative, York-Sunbury). The following is taken from Hansard regarding that subject and the necessary inquiries to be made.

Mr. Hanson: "I would like to ask the Minister of Justice, in his capacity as the representative in this House of the Postmaster-General, if a report appearing in a despatch under date of Moncton, N. B., May 29, respecting the appointment of an additional and fourth district post office inspector in the Maritime Provinces is correct. I would like to point out to him that we already have three post office inspectors in the Maritime Provinces, where I think perhaps two or even one would do. There is no necessity whatever for a fourth. This statement, I think, has all the earmarks of having been given out as an inspired utterance."

SALARIES OF POSTMASTERS

Mr. A. M. Boutillier (Vergerville): "I would ask the representative of the Postmaster-General of this House whether the scale or plan upon which the salaries of town, village and rural postmasters are to be based after July 1 has been completed, and, if so, when the information will be available to the members of the House."

WILL GO ALL OVER MUSQUASH WORKS

Commission Decides to Make Inspection That Will Occupy Two Days

At the afternoon session of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, yesterday, it was decided to hold another meeting later this month and to spend a couple of days in making an inspection trip over the entire development at Musquash, making a special examination of the various works which have been constructed there. A proposed extension to Welsford and Gagetown and along the Manawagouish Road was discussed and referred to the engineers for a report.

The commencement exercises were held yesterday on the grounds of the hospital, which will celebrate its 40th anniversary on June 6. A Newton despatch of Wednesday's date says: "The commencement address will be delivered by Rev. Dr. Arthur Maland Ellis, pastor of the Central Congregational Church of Newton, and the invocation and benediction pronounced by Rev. Edward T. Sullivan, rector of Trinity Church, Newton Centre. Vocal music will be furnished by the training school chorus, and instrumental music by the Newton Girl Scouts Bugle and Drum Corps."

"Commencement Week was ushered in on Sunday, May 30, when the baccalaureate sermon was preached at the nurses' home at 8.15 p. m. by Rev. Earl E. Harper, pastor of the Central Methodist Episcopal Church of Auburndale."

"Two parties for the members of the graduating class have been planned. One will be given by the alumnae during the week preceding graduation, and the other by the school during commencement week."

"The 28 women who will be graduated this year will receive their diplomas from C. E. Kelsey, president of the board of trustees of the Newton Hospital, and the gold badges, marking them as graduates of Newton Hospital Training School will be presented by Miss Bertha W. Allen, R. N., superintendent of the hospital. Miss Mary E. Riddle, R. N., ex-superintendent of the hospital, will present the scholarships for practice, fitness and schoolship, which are given by the Hospital Aid Association."
