## MUTES SELECT HALIFAX MAN AS NEW PRESIDENT

Convention of Maritime Association of Deaf Is Brought to Close

I. T. Goucher of Halifax was elected president unanimously and that city was selected as the place for holding the next convention in 1928, at the concluding session today of the Maritime Association of the Deaf, held in the Knights of Columbus hall. The speakers today included Miss N. McKinnon and Miss McLean, both of Halifax, and William McDonald of Saint John. Miss McKinnon explained in detail how Dr. Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone by accident during his experiments to restore speech and hearing to the deaf and dumb. Mrs. Bell, who was a daughter of the late Gardner Greene Hubbard, one of his associates later in the American Bell Telephone Co., was deaf and dumb.

Miss McLean urged the delegates to keep their credit good and conduct themselves properly wherever they were so that the deaf may command general respect.

### GOOD CONVENTION

The convention in Saint John was described as the most successful ever held by the association by Mr. McDonald, who in his address commented on the general prosperous appearance of the delegates and said that some time he hoped Saint John would have the honor of again entertaining the association.

The following officers were elected: President, L. T. Goucher, Halifax; vice-president, Osgood Worthen, Fredericton; secretary, R. E. Sowerby, Moncton; treasurer, Miss McLean, Halifax; directors for New Brunswick, William McDonald, Saint John; W. Walsh, Saint John; Mrs. O. Worthen, Fredericton; directors for Nova Scotia, Miss McKinnon, John Logan and Alexander Campbell, all of Halifax.

Hearty votes of thanks were extended to Mayor White, the citizens and the Saint John members of the association for their hospitality. Many of the visitors left town on the afternoon train.

A picnic at McLaren's Beach, featured by an extensive program of sports and a clam bake later in the afternoon, was enjoyed by the delegates to the Maritime Association of the Deaf yesterday. No business sessions were held yesterday.

A banquet was held at the beach pavilion later in the evening. The president, R. E. Sowerby, of Moncton, acted as chairman. Short speeches were made by several of the officers and members of the association at the dinner. The picnicers returned to the city between 11 and 12 o'clock last night.

## CARNEGIE OFFICIALS MEET IN HALIFAX

Will Discuss Foundation of Attitude Toward Higher Education Here

HALIFAX, N. S., July 8.—Representatives of the Carnegie Foundation are to be in Halifax next Tuesday, and consideration will then be given to the future policy of the foundation towards higher education in the Maritime Provinces.

The King's College campaign has been proceeding under the direction of Rev. A. H. Moore, the president, and it is understood that they have been successful in securing assurance to the extent of some \$200,000—the major part of which has been donated in Nova Scotia. The response to the Prince Edward Island campaign has also been generous.

### MARITIME FEDERATION

It is anticipated that the question of the Carnegie Foundation's participation in the proposed Federation of Maritime Universities will be finally discussed and settled at the meeting on Tuesday next, only two colleges having amalgamated under that plan. Windsor, Dr. A. Stanley MacKenzie, President of Dalhousie University, is returning from Europe to attend the meeting.

## FLOODS ARE REPORTED SUBSIDING IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, July 8.—Floods in Mexico brought hundreds of Indians to the Sacred Shrine of Guadalupe, where they knelt in water waist deep to pray to the ancient rain god of the Aztecs and to the Christian God to preserve them from disaster.

Today the flood waters that threatened to isolate the capital and that caused tremendous damage in the valley of Mexico were subsiding. Railroad service was still greatly disrupted, but attempts were being made to maintain communication between important points. Officials here believe the worst is over unless there are renewed downpours.

## DARK DAYS ENDED

Spanish King Optimistic; Declines to Extend Visit to England

"The dark days for Spain are over," said Alfonso at the luncheon. "We are marching ahead with lightning speed."

## Lauds Miss Bondfield

WALLSEND, Eng., July 8.—In a speech supporting the candidature of Miss Margaret Bondfield, Labor candidate in the forthcoming by-election, Ramsay MacDonald, former Labor Premier, declared that if ever there was another Labor government Miss Bondfield would certainly not be omitted. He asked a majority of 10,000 votes for her.

The by-election in Wallsend was necessitated by the resignation of Sir Patrick Hastings, K. C., Labor member. A. Charlton Curry is the Liberal candidate, and Sam Howard the Conservative nominee.

## 8-HOUR MINE BILL WILL PASS TODAY

British Lords Acting After Yorkshire Owners Yield

LONDON, July 7.—The government bill for an 8-hour day, instead of the present 7-hour day in the coalfields, will be put through its final stages tomorrow. It was announced in the House of Lords today.

The announcement came after the mine owners in Yorkshire decided to fall into line with other mining districts on the question of wages.

The early attitude of the Yorkshire owners in setting wage terms which the government considered unjustifiable and at variance with its promises to the miners, had caused temporary postponement of the presentation of the bill for its third reading.

The decision of the Yorkshire owners not to press their own terms was announced in a letter to Premier Baldwin this afternoon.

## IMPERIAL PARLEY MAY BE POSTPONED

Many in Britain Doubt if This Country's Premier Can Come in October

LONDON, July 7.—The relation of the coming general election in Canada and the pending Imperial Conference has been the subject of study by the British authorities, and the British United Press correspondent learns today from an official source that if the new Premier of Canada finds it impossible to attend an Imperial conference, the conference will be postponed.

In parliamentary circles it is doubted if, with the elections held in September, matters will be so settled that the Prime Minister of the Dominion will be able to leave the country so soon after the appeal to the ballot box, and there is always the problem of which party will be returned to power, and the necessity of consideration being given to the attitude to be adopted by Canada's representative at the conference.

As this matter will naturally take time, the authorities here are quite prepared to take the necessary steps to postpone the conference until a more suitable date—if they get word from the Dominion authorities that such a course is desirable.

## WARNS FARMERS OF HAZARD FROM FIRE

Fire Marshal Ascribes Blaze in Queens Co. to Insufficiently Cured Hay

A warning to farmers throughout the province to be sure that all hay stored in barns was properly cured was issued this morning by H. H. McLellan, provincial fire marshal, who recently returned from Queens county where he was called to investigate a fire which last Wednesday destroyed the barn of Ira H. Slipp, at Carpenter, about six miles from Wickham.

Mr. McLellan said he was satisfied that the fire had been caused by spontaneous combustion in the hay, caused by the hay being put in the barn before being properly dried out. This hay was stored last fall.

The fire marshal also inspected the house of Isaac W. Carpenter which was recently struck by lightning. Mr. McLellan was accompanied by Percy Howard who adjusted the insurance on the Slipp barn fire at \$500.
