GET TOGETHER ON EXHIBITION

Dual Ownership of Buildings Subject of City Hall Conference

Two Proposals Presented—Transfer to Association Believed Favored.

Should the Saint John Exhibition Association carry on with the yearly display or should the City Council take over the management of the fairs was a matter debated at some length this morning at a conference between a committee from the association and members of the common council.

Those present from the association were F. A. Dykeman, E. J. Terry, F. B. Schofield and H. A. Porter. The members of the council present were Commissioners Frink, Wigmore, Bullock and Harding.

DUAL OWNERSHIP.

It was said by the delegation from the association that one of the principal objections to carrying on as at present was the dual ownership of the buildings. The main building is owned by the city while the grand stand and other buildings on the grounds are owned by the association. They also stated that the grand stand needed extensive repairs, that the fence on the southern side of the grounds needed renewal and that the roof of the main building was in bad condition and needed considerable repair.

Two propositions were submitted by the delegation, first that the city transfer its title to the main building to the association and that body carry on as in the past. Under this plan the association would receive any profits which might be made by the fairs and would expect the city in the case of any large deficit in any year, to assist in making good the deficiency. The alternative proposition was that the city take over the title of the association in the buildings it owns and the members of the council act as owners and managers of the fair.

The members of the council expressed themselves as being in favor of the first proposition. It was also agreed that the city engineer should make an inspection of the property and make an estimate of the cost of renewals and replacements necessary.

WAS AT CONVENTION OF Y'S MEN'S CLUBS

Little Margaret Stanhope Much Benefitted in Shriners' Hospital, Montreal.

Little Margaret Stanhope, eight-year-old daughter of Sergeant Geo. H. Stanhope, Royal Canadian Army Service Corps, 186 Sydney street, stepped off the C. P. 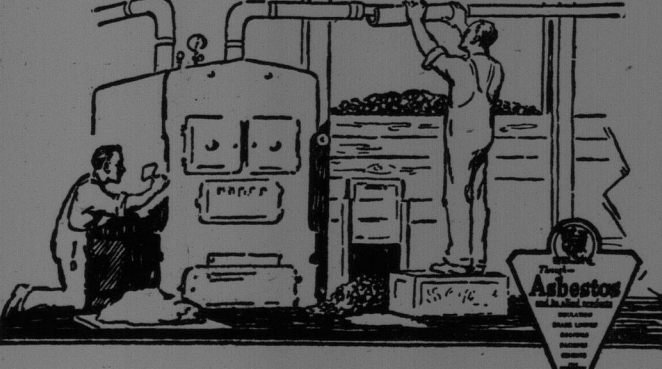
Welding Car of Power Company Was Afire
