

ACTRESS GIVES ADVICE TO GIRLS

Violet Vanbrugh Urges Up-keep of Standard of Manners

Warns Against Extravagant and Indiscriminate Use of Words

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Miss Violet Vanbrugh, the actress, offers some useful advice to the modern girl in her charming little autobiographical volume, "Dare To Be Wise," which has just been published.

"The standard of manners today has changed," she writes, "greatly owing to the different relationship that has been established between the sexes, but it is up to the girls to see that this standard does not fall too low."

"We cannot expect good manners from men if our manners to them are rough or too free and easy. The initiative comes from the woman, and only an extremely insensitive or un-

obtrusive man will fail to take his cue from the woman.

"Ill-mannered, ungracious people, be they shop girls, telephone operators, or duchesses, are very foolish people—foolish in their own interests; for moments come in the lives of every one of us, no matter how self-reliant we may be, when we need the outstretched hand."

"To exaggerate and be indiscriminate in the use of words is a temptation you must avoid. It leads to insincerity and artificiality."

"In language today, we have a reign of terror. Everything is terribly nice, terribly amusing, terribly funny. Just as when I was a little girl things were awful."

"I remember as a little girl being corrected by a friend of my father's—Dr. E. A. Freeman, the Regius Professor of History at Oxford—for saying, 'I was awfully glad to see him.'"

"To girls about to marry Miss Vanbrugh advises:

"As love is blind we cannot absolutely choose whom our love will enshrine, but we can try to realize what a tremendously important choice it is, and try to use judgment."

Paralyzed Woman Finds Husband Dead In His Bed

CAMBRIDGE, Nov. 20.—The first steps which she had taken in six years carried Mrs. Noah Hamm from her own room to that of her husband where she found him dead on Wednesday morning in their home at "Hammtown," Parish of Johnston, Queens county. Mrs. Hamm, who has been paralyzed for years, when she found that her husband did not arise at the usual hour called repeatedly to him but got no reply. Under the influence of her fearful anticipation she managed to get out of her own bed and walked to her husband's room only to find him dead.

The couple lived alone and Mrs. Hamm had to sit in the window of her home practically all morning before she succeeded, by tapping on the window, in attracting the attention of passers-by who came to her aid.

Her husband, who was 71 years of age, and had been ailing for some time, told a neighbor the night before his death that he was feeling better than for several days. He had done his usual work around the house on that day.

Dr. Walter says that Mrs. Hamm is a chronic invalid and will not be able to continue to walk.

Mr. and Mrs. Hamm lived alone, having no children except an adopted daughter, Alice, who has been married for several years, and their nearest neighbor was about a quarter of a mile away.

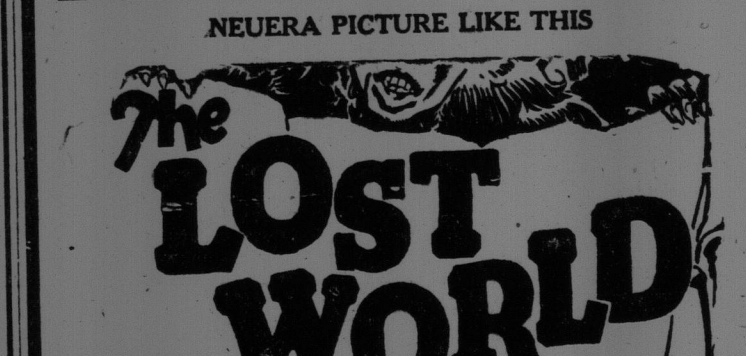

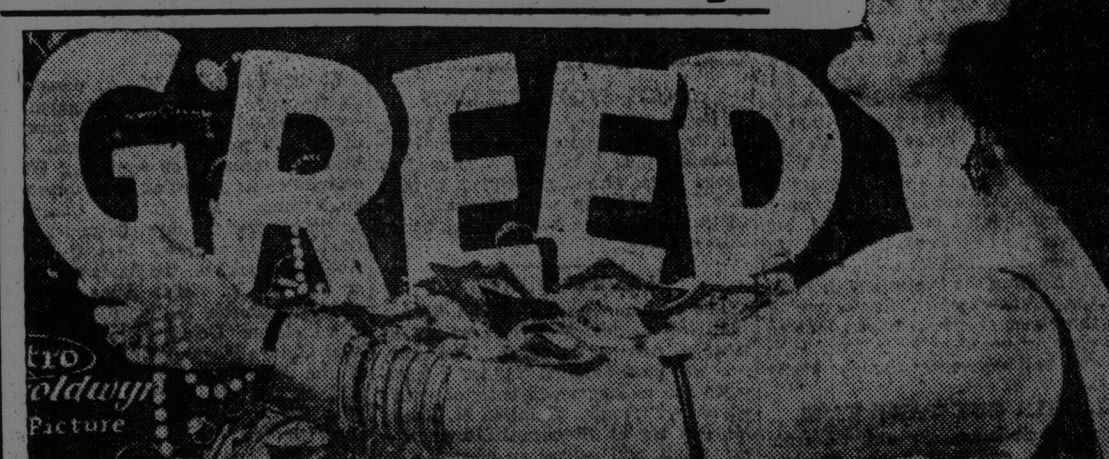

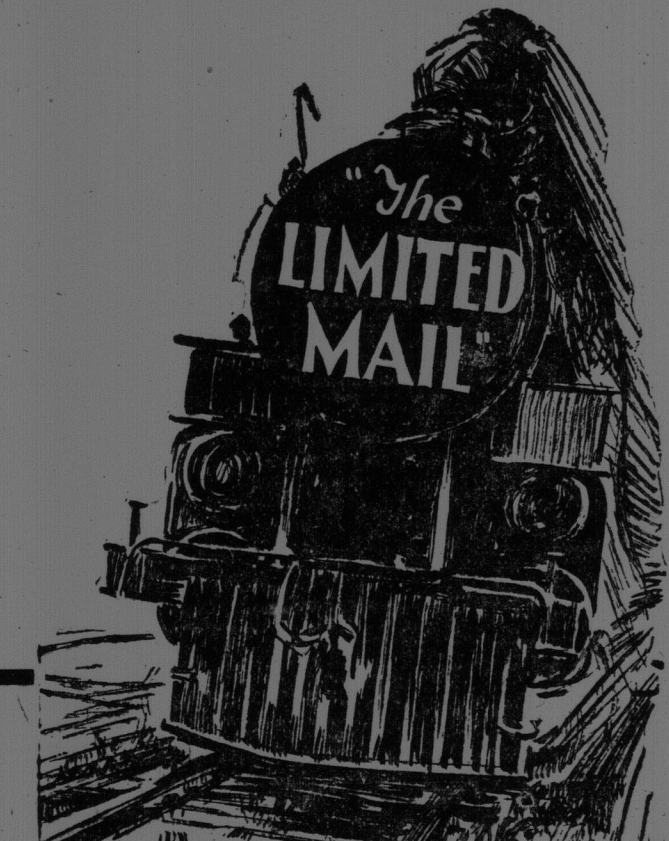
