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TAILORS SCARCE AND CLOTHES DEAR

Deportation of the Aliens Leaves
Gap in Clothing Trade in Eng-
land—Used to Under-Cut

There is a dearth of tailors in London. With the demand for clothes largely exceeding the supply, there appears to be little hope of filling the ranks of alien workers, depleted by the war, with British labor.

"The London Globe" reports that in his evidence before the Select Committee on Pensions at the House of Commons, Captain Brady stated that approximately 20,000 men could be absorbed in the trade. Some hundreds of undesirable aliens who were engaged in it, he said, had been deported.

The secretary of the London branch of the National Federation of Merchant Tailors informed a "Globe" representative that it was true the trade had been allowed to get into the hands of aliens. In the large cities, especially in the East End of London, there is a very large percentage of alien labor and at meeting of the Garment Workers' Union, which has branches all over the country, it is no uncommon thing for the proceedings to be conducted in Yiddish, as otherwise the speeches would not be understood.

Since the early days of the war there had been a great shortage of labor in the East End on account of the internment of the aliens, chiefly Germans, Hungarians and Austrians.

Worked for Low Wages

"The alien element originally got a footing in the trade over here," said the secretary, "through undercutting the English wage market, and they would work for as many hours as were required. Now, however, the position is reversed, and the foreigner today is frequently earning higher wages in the tailoring trade than the British journeyman."

In reply to a question as to how far it is likely demoralized or disabled soldiers could take up the trade and relieve the situation the secretary stated that he was the originator of the scheme for giving trade training to the disabled soldiers, so far back as November, 1914, but the results had proved disappointing.

Few Seek Training
Few men had come forward to attend the instruction classes which had been formed in London and the chief cities. Probably not over 200 ex-soldiers altogether had taken up the work and the average attendance at the classes, which are held daily, is only about twenty. The men apparently do not settle down to the monotony of the training, and they also regard the work as being more fitted to women. Another drawback is the attitude of the trade unions which regard the classes as diluters, and do not recognize them as having undergone the regular training of the trade.

Tailoring is especially suitable for men who have suffered in any way in the war," said the secretary "so the results of the classes are specially disappointing. Under the government scheme of trade training, they get a maintenance grant, separation allowance for a wife, travelling expenses and other allowances that may be considered necessary."

RAILWAY MEN WILL MAKE ATTACK ON COST OF LIVING

Detroit, Sept. 12.—The United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers, in convention here, is undertaking action to force down the cost of living. This is being done independently of the government more in the same direction, although the organization plans to co-operate with the Department of Justice in the latter's investigations.

Questionnaires have been sent to the full membership of the brotherhood, asking information as to the cost of necessities of life in every part of Canada and the United States.

Whether living costs are quickly brought back to normal, no delegates to the convention indicated they are determined not to accept any compromise on the brotherhood's wage demands. Walker D. Hines, Federal Director of Railways, who is to address the convention tomorrow, is expected to state the Railroad Administration's attitude on the wage question, and strike action by the organization may depend on what he will have to say. The matter will be fought out on the convention floor Friday.

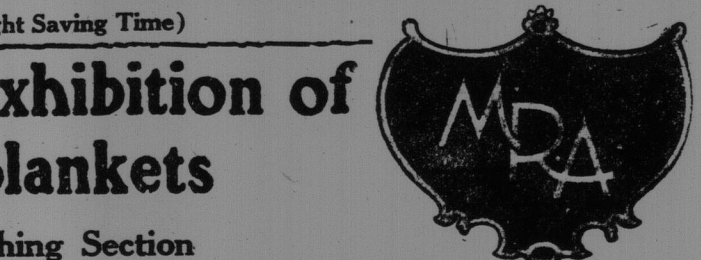
