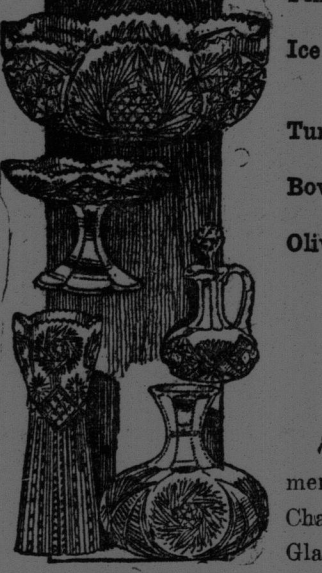

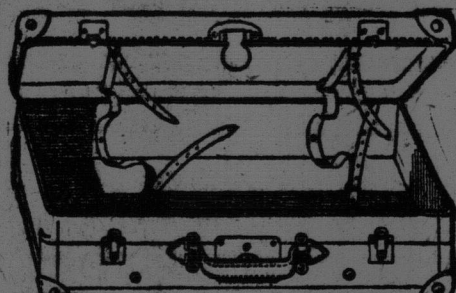
RECENT DEATHS
