THE BANK STATEMENT

In the statement published in The
Times yesterday the Canada Permanent
was entered in the list of figures show-
ing the average loans and deposits. To
be correct in the case of the Canada Per-
manent it should have been said that the
\$888,228 represented deposits only.
If the statement of loans had also been
given the amount would have been enor-
mously larger.
The statement that in the case of the
banks the substantial increase shown
was probably accounted for by deposits
is questioned by a banker, who points
out that at a time when banks are dis-
posed to withdraw their loans there is
also a shrinkage in deposits, and that
therefore there must have been last year
an increase in loans compared with the
previous year or the showing would not
have been so favorable.

If it were the Empress of Ireland or her
sister, people seemed to think that all
would be well.
And so everyone, when they read or
heard of the horrible disaster, first gasped,
"The Empress," and then began to
realize that hundreds of lives had been
lost, that hundreds of men and women
had gone down to their deaths.
There was silent mourning throughout
the city from earliest morning. It
showed on all the faces one passed in the
street.
Many of the local government board re-
ported at eight o'clock this morning that
no further word had been received of the
Empress of Ireland.
Anxiety in England
Liverpool, May 29.—Crowds gathered
extra outside the offices of the C. P. R. await-
ing information concerning the fate of the
passengers and crew of the Empress
of Ireland.
Many of the seamen and firemen be-
longed to Liverpool, and pathetic scenes
were witnessed when their wives and
children were turned away with the in-
formation that no names of survivors had
yet come through.
