

The duty of the Church, said Dr. Gordon, was to tell the world that "God is, that He is righteousness and that He is loving. "Think," he added, "what that love would do for Canada trday. It would be like ointment to a diseased body, bringing quiet and rest." But, he continued, the truth about God's love brought also the truth about man's sin. It was plain sin, he said, to go through life, as many did, without thinking of God. What was needed was a Church that would proclaim the sin of forgetting God.

Dr. Gordon then went on to point out the greatness of God's forgiveness of sin, and made a fervid appeal to those who might be estranged from other members of their families. Although sinned against, he said, God was ever ready to blot out sin and to forgive to the uttermost. He pleaded with parents of wayward children not to place themselves above God, but to extend the arms of forgiveness to the child that had gone astray and to welcome him back, with the past wiped clean from the slate.
