TORONTO, Feb. 11.—It took only forty minutes to transact the Government business in the Legislature yesterday. The things accomplished were principally routine. Several hills which have been reconstructed by the statute revision committee were considered by a committee of the whole, and will be given their final readings to-day. In none of the bills were there any important changes, they being merely brought up to date.

N. W. Rowell, leader of the Opposition, made his first appearance in the House. During the past two weeks he was ill with influenza, but he seems to have fully recovered. There is a possibility that when the debate on the speech from the throne resumes to-day the Liberal chief will speak in reply to arguments from Conservative members. Besides the wide range of subjects touched upon in the speech, Mr. Rowell will deal with tax reform.

Immediately after the House convened Mr. Rowell was each acked weeks.
