## APPLE CROPSHORT.

In Ontario Only One-Third of the Average Will Be Picked.

Toronto, Aug. 10.—There was a long discussion at the concluding session of the apple shippers yesterday regarding this year's apple crop in Ontario, that only 35 per cent. of the usual crop would be picked in the Province, though Mr. Smith of Burlington declared that the yield would not exceed 10 per cent.

The yield will be small all over the United States, except in Colorado, California, Oregon and Washington Territory, where excellent crops are in sight.

## SENSATIONAL ELOPEMENT.

Princess Olga Somonowski Fleed With a Gipsy and Was Caught.

Vienna, Aug. 10.—An elopement like that of the Princess Chimay, with the exception that its ending was quick and tragic, has been reported here. The Princess Olga Somonowski, the daughter of a Russian magnate of royal blood, recently eloped with a gipsy musician at Ballanston, Hungary. The Princess visited the restaurant in which the gipsy performed, fell in love with him and they eloped after the musician had completed his work of the day. The father and brothers of the Princess started in pursuit of the couple, and on the second day, caught them. The elopers were dealt with summarily. The gipsy was thrashed and the Princess, who had disgraced her family, was handed a revolver, with which she shot herself.

## Prince of Orleans Dead.

Saigon, French Cochinchina, Aug. 10.—Prince Henry of Orleans died at 3.30 p. m. yesterday. He was the eldest son of the Duke of Orleans and a cousin of the Duke of Orléans. He was born in 1867, and was not married. The Prince has been dangerously ill for some time past. While his cousin, the Duke of Orléans, with whom he was in open enmity, aspired to be King of France, Prince Henry aimed at becoming President of the Republic. At his death he was bankrupt.

## Gave Life For Her Boy.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 10.—Mrs. Fred Shepherd lost her life at New Glasgow yesterday in an heroic effort to save her boy from drowning. The boy fell into an old quarry in which was ten feet of water. The mother plunged into the water after the boy, and she managed to hold him up until assistance came. The boy was saved, but the mother's strength was exhausted and she was drowned.

## King to Leave England.

London, Aug. 10.—King Edward, Queen Alexandra, Princess Victoria, Prince Nicholas of Greece and a distinguished official party left London last night for Port Victoria. All will sleep on board the royal yacht that awaits the King, and sail for Funchal this morning. The royal party will proceed to Cronberg and thence to Potsdam for the funeral next Tuesday.

## A Reckless Man at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—A. D. Viau, a young man 20 years of age, was arrested last night for firing three shots from a revolver at T. Layou, a constable of 13 years of age. One of the balls struck Layou in the arm. Viau was in a bean dive, and was drinking. It is said some boys were annoying him, which was his only apparent reason for firing the shots.

## A Lad's Brave Act.

Niagara Falls, Aug. 10.—While Willie Johnson, aged 11, was swimming on the Canadian side of the whirlpool Thursday afternoon, he attempted to reach a log, and was being drawn into the vortex when a Queenston lad named Cooper swam out after him and towed him to shore. Cooper's act was a daring one, and he deserves some recognition.

## A Man/ohio Man Dead.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—The following cable has been received at the Militia Department:

"Johannesburg, Aug. 7.—Regret to report A. J. 826, Trooper Nelson Hill, S.A.C., died of enteric fever, Krugerdorp, Aug. 3. Next of kin is Thomas Hill, father, Virden, Manitoba."

## Many Are the Workers.

Winnipeg, Aug. 10.—There has been a busy scene at the C.P.R. during the past 24 hours, owing to the arrival of Ontario harvesters. Four more trains arrived last night, bringing in nearly 3,000. These men are being distributed all over the province as quickly as possible.

## TO END THE BOER WAR

New Policy Adopted by Government to That End.

## THE LEADERS TO BE BANISHED

Cost of Feeding Their Families to Be Charged Against Their Property.

Text of Lord Kitchener's Proclamation to the Boers in the Field—Grace to Sept. 15.

London, Aug. 10.—A Parliamentary paper has been published containing a proclamation issued by Lord Kitchener August 7 in accordance with instructions from the Imperial Government, the Governments of Cape Colony and Natal concurring.

The reasons of the Government for the proclamation are set forth in a preamble to the proclamation as follows:

"Whereas, the late Orange Free State and South African Republic have been annexed to His Majesty's dominions; and,

"Whereas, His Majesty's forces are and have been for some considerable time in complete possession of the aforesaid territories, with their public offices and the whole machinery of administration, as well as of all the principal towns and the whole of the railways; and,

"Whereas, a great majority of the burghers of the two late republics to the number of 35,000, exclusive of those who have fallen in the war, are now either prisoners or have submitted to His Majesty's Government and are living peaceably in towns and camps under the control of His Majesty's forces; and,

"Whereas, the burghers of the late republics still in arms are not only few in number, but have lost almost all their guns and munitions of war and are devoid of regular military organization, and are, therefore, unable to carry on regular warfare or to offer any organized resistance to His Majesty's forces in any part of the country; and,

"Whereas, these burghers who are still in arms, though unable to carry on regular warfare, continue to make isolated attacks upon small posts and detachments of His Majesty's forces, to plunder or destroy property and to damage railway and telegraph lines; and,

"Whereas, the country is thus kept in a state of disturbance checking the resumption of agricultural and industrial pursuits; and,

"Whereas, His Majesty's Government is determined to put an end to a state of things which is endlessly prolonging bloodshed and destruction and inflicting ruin upon a great majority of the inhabitants who are anxious to live in peace and earn a livelihood for themselves and their families; and,

"Whereas, it is just to proceed against those still resisting and especially against those persons who, being in a position of authority, are responsible for the continuance of the present state of lawlessness and are instigating their fellow-burghers to continue their hopeless resistance to His Majesty's Government."

Therefore Lord Kitchener issues his proclamation:

"All commandants, field cornets and leaders of armed bands, being burghers of the late republics, and still engaged in resisting His Majesty's forces, whether in the Orange River Colony, the Transvaal or other portion of His Majesty's South African dominions, and all members of the Governments of the late Orange Free State and Transvaal shall, unless they surrender before September 15, be permanently banished from South Africa. The cost of the maintenance of the families of all burghers in the field who have not surrendered by September 15, shall be recoverable from such burghers and shall be a charge upon their property, removable and immovable, in the two colonies."

The preliminary correspondence shows that the proclamation is based upon suggestions which the Government Natal forwarded to Colonial Secretary Chamberlain July 24, and that the date, September 15, was recommended by Lord Milner.

## OUTRAGE BY BOERS.

Reported to Have Captured and Shot a Lieutenant and a Trooper of Steiner's Horse.

London, Aug. 10.—According to a despatch to The Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marquez the Boers are reported to have captured and shot in cold blood a lieutenant and a trooper of Steiner's Horse in revenge for their being instrumental in shooting a Boer despatch rider.

Kitchener Wounded.

London, Aug. 10.—There is an unconfirmed rumor current here that Gen. Lord Kitchener has been wounded in a skirmish outside of Pretoria.

London, Aug. 10.—The War Office has received no advice giving color to the rumor circulated by a news agency in the United States, that Lord Kitchener has been wounded in a skirmish with the Boers. The rumor is officially discredited. Lord Kitchener's customary despatches reached the War Office yesterday afternoon and contained no reference to any accident to him.

Steps to See Kruger.

Paris, Aug. 10.—It was reported on the Bourse yesterday that Mr. Stays, the former President of the Orange Free State, will shortly join Mr. Kruger in Holland, with the view of reaching a definite understanding in regard to the peace overtures.
