This product sold at 4c. a bunch or three bunches for 10c. New onions sold at the same prices and were abundant. Rhubarb was also a ready seller at from five to ten cents a bunch. All the garden products of the season found an exceptionally ready sale, buyers being quite plentiful to-day. Potatoes were in some quantity and sold at a dollar a bag. In the dried butter was very scarce at 16 and 17 cents. Eggs were quite plentiful at 10 cents. Chickens were in fair receipt at 25 to 30 cents apiece.

WOULD SHOOT WEYLER.

A Spanish Minister who is not afraid of the butcher.

Madrid, May 3.—Gen. Polavieja, minister of war, has made public a letter which he has just despatched to Gen. Weyler, in which he threatens, without excess of circumlocution, to shoot the former Governor-General of Cuba. Gen. Polavieja declares that he knows all about Gen. Weyler's absurd conspiracies, and adds: "I know that you are incapable. Without risking your own hide, you excite the passions of civilians, who are ignorant of your weaknesses; but I am disposed to shoot Generals, if need be, as if they were common soldiers." This letter is called forth by General Weyler's recent mysterious conferences with Carlists of the Boleiro Isles and Republicans of Barcelona.
