COREA THE STORM CENTRE.

U. S. Minister Describes Situ ation in Far East.

Japan Relative to Corea Pointed Out.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., Oct. 20.

—Horace N. Allen, United States minister to Cores, who has been in that country for the last eighteen years, and who is en route to the Orient, spent yesterday at Colorado Springs. He left Seoul last spring, crossed Russia by the trans-Siberian rallway and spent the summer in Europe and the United States. Regarding the political situation in the East, Mr. Allen says: So far as the negotiations that are now being carried on by Russia, China and Japan, I, of course, do not care to be quoted. Our position is that of a neutral friend to each.

"Corea is regarded as the storm centre of Asis. It has been under the alternate dominion of China, Russia and Japan, but since Japan waged its successful war with China to secure the absolute independence of Corea, China has been driven out of the country and the strife for supremacy has been between Russian and Japan. During the past year, Russia has held most of the northern frontier of Corea. In the operation of this concession, the Russian concessionaires have run counter to the interest of certain Japanese who held similar agreements with local magistrates. It is thought that this concession may lead to serious consequences.
