Cumberland Coal and Railway Co vs. St. John Pilotage Commission.

The trial of the case of the Cumberland Coal and Railway Company, of Parrsboro, N. S., against the St. John Pilotage Commission, was resumed this morning before Judge McLeod in the admiralty court after an adjournment of some weeks.

This is an action for the refunding

of pilotage fees amounting to \$15,680.08 paid to the pilotage commission by the plaintiff company on the barges arriv-Buckingham Palace was particularly animated. Large crowds selected this barges are not sailing vessels and con-sequently should be exempt from pilotthe statutory description of sailing

Joseph A. Likely, agent for the Cum berland Coal and Railway Company, gave some important testimony. He said he had been agent for the com-pany since the adoption of barges in 1893. These barges were towed by tugs and were provided with no means self-propulsion. They did not have masts but were provided with derricks for the loading and discharging of coal. Occasionally two small sails, called leg-o'-mutton sails, were used, but these did not propel the barges but were used merely as a means of steadying in a strong wind.
