TWO BIG OCEAN STEAMERS ON THE ROCKS SIDE BY SIDE

Within Sight of Each Other PIKE COUNTY WEDDING

White Star Liner Suevic, and the Elder Dempster S. S. Jebba are Ashore-The Passengers Have Been Safely Landed

. LONDON, March 18.—Details received this morning of the disaster to the White Star Line steamér Suevic, homeward bound from Sydney, N. S. W., via Cape Town with nearly 600 passengers and crew on board, show that she struck the Brandles rocks close under the Lizard lighthouse at about 10.30 last night, and will probably be a total wreck. Life boats and tugs from the Lizard and Falmouth soon reached the scene, and together with the Suevic's own boats, commenced landing the passengers. The women and children were first sent ashore. There were no fewer than 160 children on board, many of them being babies in arms, whom the local fishermen and their wives lifted out of the boats and carried through the surf to the near-by

and from the forward boats loaded with passengers were sent ashore in quick succession.

By 1 p. m all the passengers had been landed but the crew were still standing by the vessel.

The wrecked steamer's bow was low down in the water, her fore compartments were full and she seemed to be pinnacled on the rocks. FOUND THE BODIES

Regularly—Important Decision Today. A long delayed case brought by Capt. Smith, of G. Co., 62nd Fusiliers, against two members of that company, Walter Coleman and James Stevens, for not attending drill was concluded in the police court this morning after having been before the courts for the past seven or eight months. The charge was that on July 18, 1906, these two men had remained away from the drill, contrary to the regulations. The case has been postponed frequently, and when it was called on today, reither the defendants nor their counsel, J. King Kelley, were present. Col. J. R. Armstrong appeared for the prosecution. Evidence of a more or less technical nature with regard to the regulations was given by Col. Edwards, Major Magee and Captain Smith. It was shown that the men had taken their uniforms, had agreed to comply with the regulations, had been directed to attend drill, but did not do so. The magistrate accordingly imposed a fine of \$5 or 20 days imprisonment on each. ANOTHER MASSACRE OF JEWS IN ROUMANIA AGAINST 1,000 BATS

NEW YORK, March 13.—The cable despatches received last night by the Jewish Morning Journal, of this city, reporting that terrible massacres have occurred at Podihilo, Roumania, have caused constantion among the Roumanian Jews in New York. They fear another Kishinieff affair, in which so many Russian Jews perished. Podihilo is only about thirty miles from Kishinieff, which is in the province of Bessabara, across the Russian frontier.

All of the Roumanian societies in New York have been notified to attend a mass meeting at Manhattan Lyceum, in the heart of East Side Ghetto, in order to devise measures for relief.

Kirchner, which he changed to Father Roman. He is 62 years old, and his sister, Mrs. Kate Kirchner, lives in this city. Last week the priest obtained permission from the Abbot of the Monastery to visit his sister, and on Thursday he boarded the Iroquois at Jacksonville.
