TWO DISEASES WHICH ARE GREATLY ON THE INCREASE

(Mall and Empire). Hon. J. W. St. John, Drummond, the habilitant, poet; George T. Marks, of Port Arthur; Dr. Ross, of Dundas; and Dr. Lewis, of Dufferin, are a few names that occur in strong, vigorous men, in the very prime of life, suddenly cut off by heart failure or kidney disease in some of its forms. Heart and kidney disease has not figured as one of the most prolific cause of death, and heart failure, according to popular conception, has been reserved for either the weakling or the gross-fed, inactive man, who piles on fat, and at last falls a victim of his clogging flesh. But these men come into neither of the classes mentioned. Dr. Drummond was famed for his strength; St. John was a man of tremendous physique, Dr. Lewis and Mr. Marks were stalwart specimens of manhood. HEART AND KIDNEY DISEASES. The fact of the matter is that heart and kidney ailments are increasing at an alarming rate, and threaten to preserve the present ratio of deaths per thousand in the face of medical triumphs that conquer one disease after another. If we add pneumonia to heart disease and kidney disease we have named the three maladies that show the most alarming growth. The man-in-the-street forms the idea that these diseases are increasing from the notices he reads in the newspapers and the medical statisticians for once endorse the popular view, and announce the increasing dangers of these diseases. Dr. Thomas Darlington, New York's Commissioner of Health, and president of the American Climatological Association, in a recent address declared that the mortality from heart and kidney troubles has almost doubled in New York, Chicago, and Boston in the past twenty-five years. AN ALARMING INCREASE. The increase is marked in all parts of the country, but is especially alarming in the cities. Here are some of the figures: Heart Bright's Combined Disease. Disease. Dth. rate. THE PRICE OF STRENUOUSITY. The figures are per 10,000 of population, and the two diseases are classed together in the fourth column because of their etiological relation. They show that in every city investigated, with the exception of Sacramento, Bright's disease is on the increase, while only three cities show a decrease of deaths from heart failure. In New York, Boston, and Chicago, the actual deaths from heart and kidney disease in 1880 were 2,237, and in 1905, 12,218. That Canadian statistics, if available, would tell an equally disconcerting story can hardly be doubted, for the causes of the increase of these diseases in the United States operate here, and as a factor in our everyday life are growing rapidly. Modern rush, worry, and excitement are the great causes of heart disease and kidney trouble. "They are the price of the strenuous life." As Dr. Darlington says: "The spirit which prompts 11 p. m. editions of the daily papers to be on sale at 11 a. m. is clearly indicative of sufficient cause for the appalling increase in deaths from heart disease."

heart, for drunkenness is less common, but stimulation is on the increase. How shall it profit a man if he gives up hard drinking, but seeks and obtains a greater stimulus in every waking hour of his life? Then the stimulation is not an incident to the day's work; it is the day's work. Then Dr. Darlington: "The quiet and calm of sylvan life is within the grasp of a few of us, but rational living, hygienic precepts, and the law of physical and mental repose are doctrines which must be forcibly brought home in order to cope with this menace."

A heavy northeast gale, with rain, which has lasted nearly three days. The mills had to suspend operations for two days. Farring has also been retarded on account of the weather. Hay, oats and potatoes have been very scarce, but a good supply has been brought in from Prince Edward Island.

STREAM DRIVERS RAISE LIVELY FUN AT CAMPBELLTON

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., May 30--A large number of stream drivers have been in town during the past few days. On Monday night some who were under the influence of liquor began to fight. Officer Savoie, who arrested the "drifters," was tackled by several of the man's friends. Police-man Duncan came to his assistance, and after four arrests had been made the crowd dispersed. The next day Magistrate Matheson fined each of the four five dollars and costs. Dr. Skinner of St. John is spending ten days at the famous salmon pools at Flatlands, ten miles above Campbellton. It is rather early for salmon as yet, but last night a big catch of sea trout was made at Tides Head. Great strings of trout are being taken every day at Parker's Lake. A very heavy rain began falling Tuesday noon and continued until late Wednesday night. The river is rising rapidly and as a consequence very few drives will be hung up this season. The tug Christina was slightly injured by fire on Sunday morning. The building boom still continues. Campbellton is to have a new hotel, which is to be known as the King Edward. The contract has been awarded to Mann and Baxter, and building operations will be begun immediately. A number of dwelling houses are in process of erection and others will be erected during the summer. The Waverly Hotel is to have a new stone foundation. The I. C. E. are erecting a new fence from Mowat's Corner to Andrew street. The Harquail concern are building a large spring race to facilitate the shipping of lumber.

2500 MEN IDLE IN THE COLLIERIES

SYDNEY, May 31--Twenty-five hundred men who have been idle in collieries of Nova Scotia Steel Company will probably return to work Monday morning. This is the fifth day since Thursday week that the mines have been closed down, which will seriously affect the output for May. It is understood that the Dominion Coal Company has struck the Emery seam at No. 6 and that it is 41-2 feet in thickness. Boring for the Emery at number 6 has been going on for some time. The company will in all probability work the Emery seam there, which will mean a greater output and a greater number of men employed at No. 6. The company was boring for the Emery at Bridgport some time ago, but the drills were lost and no work has been done there since.

FRENCH PORTS ARE PARALYZED BY STRIKE

PARIS, May 31--An admirably organized universal strike by all branches of the shipworkers of France has paralyzed life in the ports of the republic. Unlike an ordinary strike, this movement is not attended with bitterness against the employers or revolutionary feelings. The manifestations are made with the object of drawing the attention of the country to the strikers' cause. The naval reservists claim, in a manifesto issued today, in which they ask the support of all classes, that it is impossible for the widows of seamen to support themselves and raise children on the pensions granted by the government. The cabinet will hold a special meeting tomorrow in an effort to find a way to bring the strike to an ending.
