Alexander Fraser, Esq., M.P., London, W. 3rd August, 1908.

FOOTBALL SEASON NOW ATTRACTING ATTENTION

With the reopening of the city schools considerable interest in the coming football season is already being taken. The High School boys will meet on the Every Day Club grounds this morning. The athletic club will be reorganized at a meeting in the near future. The High School has always been able to produce a strong team on the local gridiron. Although it will be greatly weakened by the loss of some of their star players there still remains good material as shown in the recent High School and Intercollegiate sports. Hockey will also have an intermediate team. St. Peter's will withdraw from the senior league and are contemplating putting a team in the intermediate league.

UNITED STATES IMMIGRATION OFFICER

Peter Miller has lately been exceptionally energetic in making examination of steamship crews. It is the United States immigration law that all steamships flying the Stars and Stripes must have a crew of whom at least two-thirds are United States citizens. The Eastern Line steamships are being examined, and it may be that if there is over a third of the crew foreigners some good hard working Canadians may be compelled to lose their positions or take the oath of allegiance to the United States. When the steamer Calvin Austin arrived yesterday from Boston a number of the crew who had shore leave when the boat arrived were obliged to remain on board awaiting the examination by Officer Miller. It is needless to say that the men were not pleased.

LONDON'S PAUPERS.

The pauperism of London, according to the weekly statement issued by the local government board, stood at 118,349 on Saturday, August 1. This total was made up of 74,625 indoor and 43,724 outdoor paupers, and was higher by 2,619 than that for the corresponding period of 1907, the rate of pauperism per 1,000 of the population being 24.5. The figures for the three previous years were: 1907, 117,739 paupers (7,468 indoor and 41,164 outdoor), or 24.1 per 1,000 of the population; 1906, 111,272 paupers (7,720 indoor and 39,552 outdoor), or 23.8 per 1,000 of the population; 1905, 116,546 paupers (7,330 indoor and 41,156 outdoor), or 23.1 per 1,000 of the population.

An examination of the figures setting forth the distribution shows that of the total increase of 2,074 the share of the Poplar Union was 1,235, or nearly half. The pauperism of this Union for the period in question was 5,239, or 54.8 per 1,000 of the population, as against 24.5 for the whole metropolis. The rate of pauperism per 1,000 of the population in some of the neighboring unions was much lower. In Bethnal Green it was 24.4, and in Whitechapel 21.0.

Of the total pauperism of Poplar, as many as 5,421 persons were facing out-relief, while the entire outdoor pauperism of the six other East End Unions put together was only 2,581. In Stepney, and Mile End decreases were registered.—Westminster Gazette.

ANOTHER CHANGE ON SCOTCH COAL

A grand opening of the big show will take place on Saturday evening, Sept. 1. The following well known persons have been invited to speak at the opening: His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor, Tweedie, His Worship Mayor, Bullock, Premier Hasten, D. V. Landry (Commissioner of Agriculture), Hon. William Fugatey (Minister of Public Works), and Dr. Daniel, M. P. It is expected that all these gentlemen will be present. In addition Miss Darling, a talented singer, will be heard in several solos.

A number of the young friends of Miss Josephine C. McGuire gathered at her home last evening and tendered her a surprise party. During the evening Joseph Donnelly on behalf of those assembled presented Miss McGuire with a handsome ring and a mountain pen. Refreshments were served and an enjoyable evening was spent. Miss McGuire leaves this evening by Boston boat for New York, where she will enter the New York General Hospital on Sept. 1. 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KINGS-ALBERT LIBERALS IN HEARTY CONVENTION

CHOOSE DR. McALISTER

In that contest, viz., the Highway Act, the Central Railway, the Public Debt and the School Book Question, and then in terse fashion, he pointed out how little satisfaction had followed the coming into power of the Conservative administration. Amid much applause, he told them how soon as they were elected they would begin to pay next year, and in a brief way he disposed of their extravagant assertions regarding debt and the school book question. Speaking of himself, he said that there was no man or no candidate who was likely to be nominated in some way. Even Mr. Fowler, the present representative of the county, and who was elected by a large majority, was likely to be nominated in some way. The chairman put the question to the meeting and there was a unanimous standing vote of approval.

On the presentation of the nomination to Dr. McAlister he again addressed the audience and thanked them from the bottom of his heart for the splendid unanimous vote they had given him. In warm words of praise he spoke of the Hon. Mr. Caman, declaring that he would have been a splendid candidate. He touched very briefly upon some of the public questions of the day and complimented a great number of those present upon the fact that they were interested in the best productive industry of the county, that of agriculture. After another brief reference to the past office of the Hon. Mr. Caman, the Minister of Public Works, the credit for being, in his opinion, one of the ablest cabinet ministers this province has ever given to Canada. He thought St. John should be proud of him. He knew that Kings and Albert would have been delighted had he consented to accept the nomination they were ready to tender him, but it may be, he continued, that he would do more good for his province as a whole in his present position as a representative of the county, and he thought that they would never give him up.

A voice—He ought not to have objection. (Applause.)

Dr. McAlister—"If I am elected, and I feel sure that I am going to be, I will give Dr. Fugatey my hearty support, and more than that, I will fight through thick and thin to do the best I can for the united constituency of Kings and Albert. (Loud applause.)
