Strawberries are reported to be very plentiful.

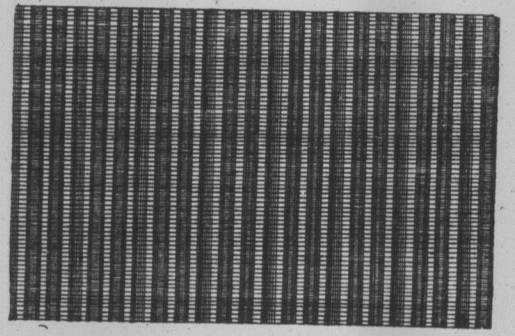
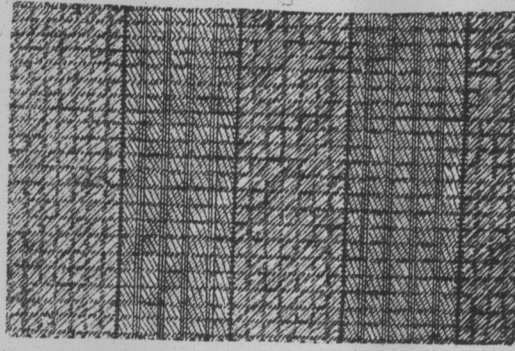
Mrs. Graham of St. Stephen, is visiting Mrs. Harry Frye.

We have seen it stated in a New Brunswick paper that four life-sized full-length portraits, that are hung in the legislature building in Fredericton, have been discovered to be of great value.

The portraits are of King George and his queen, Lord Sheffield and Lord Glenelg. The two first named are the work of Sir Joshua Reynolds, and the others are by famous artists. They are splendid productions, and are said to be priceless.

This is hardly a "discovery" for it has been known for a long time that these portraits were exceedingly valuable. It may interest New Brunswick readers to know that the portrait of Lord Sheffield was found in an attic of Government House some years ago, and that it bore marks showing that it had been used as a target. The story told at the time was that the sons of Lieutenant-Governor Manners-Sutton were the youths who tried their skill in shooting on his Lordship's portrait.
