


## Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any nuale over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Dotigias, Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agen-Sub-Agency for the district. Entry cy, on certain conditions, by father. mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties-Six months residence and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his fathe, mother, son, daughter

> In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a stead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dutor pre emption six months in each of try (including the time required to afty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted
