FOR SUSSEX BURGLARY

Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Killen Arrest Three Men Thought to be Sussex Safe Crackers.

Saturday afternoon Deputy Chief Jenkins and Detective Killen arrested three men who were thought to be the safe crackers who burgled the office of the Orange lodges of the city and county of St. John.

When Everett Lounsbury, a young fellow in charge of the engine, entered the building Saturday morning, he found the office in a state of confusion. The papers were scattered about, and thrown in every direction were clothes which had been dipped in cream vats and used to deaden the sound.

The police were promptly notified and investigation showed that a team had driven in the premises and entrance was gained to the building by a back window. Then while one or more of the party blew the safe, one watched at the rear end of the building.

The work was cleverly and cleanly done. There was no mistake made and just the right quantity of nitroglycerin was used to do the job without making unnecessary noise.

The tools with which the men worked were taken from George Dymait's blacksmith shop at Sussex Corner. This was entered during the early part of the night and a brace and bit, sledge hammer, drill and ratchet screw driver were taken. They were left on the floor of the office near the safe, having answered their purposes.

Commissioner Burton well Pleased with the Manner in which the Work has been Handled to date.

G. K. Burton, census commissioner for St. John, stated yesterday that the work of taking the census was proceeding favorably, and that it was expected that the enumerators would complete their assignments by the end of the month. In some wards where there is a foreign population the enumerators have experienced considerable difficulty in getting the information needed, but they make better progress as they become more familiar with their work.

As regards the schools Mr. Burton said the enumerators visited them in the ordinary course of their work, and got what information they required from the school principals. In most cases the enumerators filled out the forms themselves from information supplied by the principals. The commissioner said that, though the total population and various other data relating to the city would be computed here, no information would be given out till the returns had been forwarded to Ottawa and checked by the officials there.
