SUBPOENAS WERE ISSUED BY SCORE IN DYNAMITE CASE

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 10.—Subpoenas for scores of persons who are believed to know about explosions in New York city and in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Illinois, Iowa and other parts of the middle west, were issued today by the government officials who are conducting the federal grand jury's investigation of the dynamite conspiracy.

Many of the witnesses are said to be called because of new disclosures made by Orrie McManigal, the confessed dynamite maker for three days has been examined by U. S. Attorney Miller.

Leavenworth, Kan., Jan. 10.—Photographs of finger prints found on a gasoline launch believed to have been used by the men who took the dynamite from the Grant Powder Works supposedly to blow up the Los Angeles Times building, were compared with photographs of finger prints of the McNamara brothers and found to be quite different.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in the Northwest Territories or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Homestead must be residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years. Price \$10.00 per acre. Five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, brother, sister or son.

Good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years. Price \$10.00 per acre and erect a house worth \$500.00.

The Board of Assessors of Taxes for the City of Saint John hereby require all persons liable to be rated for the year 1912 forthwith to furnish to the assessors true statements of all their property, real estate, personal estate and income, which is assessable under "The Saint John City Assessment Act, 1909." Extracts from "The Saint John City Assessment Act, 1909." "Sec. 32. The assessors shall ascertain as nearly as possible the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of every person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 43. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the assessors the statement under oath within the time required; nor shall the Common Council, in any case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a Bill will be presented for enactment at the next Session of the Provincial Legislature to further amend the "St. John Assessment Act, 1909," and amending Acts.

The objects desired to be attained by this Act are:

(1) To provide that after the 1st day of January, 1912, no tax on buildings and improvements be reduced fifty per centum and after such date still further reduced from time to time until the tax on such buildings and improvements disappears altogether, and that the land exclusive of buildings shall be assessed at twice the true value, to provide for the revenue lost on account of the decrease in the taxation of such buildings and improvements.

(2) To provide that personal property be exempt from taxation as soon as circumstances will permit.

(3) To empower the Common Council of the City of Saint John to appoint a Commission which shall have to adjust as equitably as possible all difficulties which may arise on account of the change above mentioned, particularly with reference to long renewal leases.

(4) To provide that the Five dollar poll tax be reduced to two dollars.

(5) To repeal Section 1 of the Act of Assembly 1910, to amend the City of Saint John, N.B., the Eleventh day of January, A.D., 1912.
