TROUBLE WITH CANDIDATES

Opposition Supporters in Queens Little Interested In Contest—Telegraph Makes Another Blunder.

Queens, June 9.—The people of this agricultural community are greatly amused at the satisfaction which the Daily Telegraph expresses over the fact that in some of the counties farmers have been secured as candidates of the opposition in this connection. The Telegraph has said many complimentary things about the men engaged in agricultural pursuits. The remarks applied by the Telegraph to the farmers named as opposition candidates will, of course, apply with equal force to the men who have been placed on the government ticket. In the county of Queens it is very doubtful if there is any opposition. Col. McLean was in the county and, it is understood, practically dragged Mr. King and Mr. Carpenter to the fight. As far as can be learned, Mr. King has done nothing and Mr. Carpenter is sticking to his farm planting potatoes. It is on regard as doubtful if either of these gentlemen will go to the point of putting up his deposit, as it is known now that their fight is hopeless.

The people of Queens, especially those engaged in agricultural pursuits, are in line with the opinion that there is no doubt but it would be a great advantage to the province if more farmers were elected to the legislature, but in this connection they cannot but disagree with the Telegraph in the statement that the present government has not cared for the agricultural interests of the province. It is well known that Mr. Copp is not in sympathy with the farmers and it is not at all likely that the men who earn their living by their day's toil on their farms are going to exchange Mr. Fleming's wise and sympathetic administration for the vague promises of the Tantalum lawyer.

THREE WORLD'S RECORDS

Toronto, June 9.—Three world's records were broken in the 15 mile invitation race run at the Island Stadium last night, and won by Tom Long. Boat after one of the steadiest and brainiest consists of the Indian's career. The starters were Longboat, Alfred Shrub, Ted Wood and Billy Quail. Shrub led from the start to the five mile, where he set a new mark of 25.19 then a weak fragment in his ankle caused him to be stopped after going 6 1/2 miles. The other three ran bunched in this order—Wood, Quail, Longboat—to 8 1/2 miles where Wood and the Indian took a short lead on Quail which they gradually increased until at 10 miles they led Quail by half a lap. The time for the 10 miles was 51.42.35 which is slower than the record but the record distance for an hour was beaten by several yards. For the last five miles Wood led by a scant yard, and although he tried to shake Longboat off, the Indian clung on; in the last lap the two rivals ran like fresh starters, the final quarter being run in 1:02, and at the end of a magnificent sprint, Longboat nosed Wood by a foot in the last five yards. The new record for the 15 miles was 1:18.10.

UPPER CANADIAN LACROSSE

SHAMROCKS, 3; MONTREAL, 1. Montreal, June 8.—Following further desertions on the part of their best players to secure the high salaries being paid by clubs in the Dominion Lacrosse Association, the Montreal lacrosse team was again defeated by the Shamrocks in a national lacrosse union fixture this afternoon. The score was 3 to 1. A number of the best of the Shamrock's players have jumped to the other league, but the Irish have not been so hard hit as the Montreal club.

NATIONALS DEFEATED.

Montreal, June 8.—The Irish Canadians, a team composed almost of ex-Shamrock and Montreal lacrosse players, was defeated this afternoon by the Nationals by a score of 6 to 0. The Irish Canadians played poorly and did not earn the salaries that they are receiving, while the Nationals played hard lacrosse throughout and earned the game. The score was a rough one but no one was badly hurt. The league was considerably enriched by the fines imposed officially as penalties.

TORONTO, 8; TUCUMSEH, 3.

Toronto, June 8.—A high crowd turned out to see the Toronto and Tecumseh teams play lacrosse this afternoon in a scheduled lacrosse fixture. Toronto showed superior speed and won 8 to 3.

ATHLETE BREAKS HIS LEG

Ottawa, June 9.—The first serious accident that has occurred in a lacrosse game in Ottawa for many years occurred during the Capital-Cornwall match at Lansdowne Park, Saturday afternoon, when Ernie Butterworth the well known hockey referee, who was playing on the Capital home-field, sustained a fracture of the right leg between the knee and the ankle. Butterworth and Bob Deegan were racing for the ball behind the Capital net in the second quarter when Deegan crashed into the Capital boy, knocking him down. As Butterworth fell his own stock became caught between his legs and he went down in a heap. At first it was thought that he had sustained only a bruise, but Ernie himself exclaimed: "Don't touch me, please, my leg is broken," and an examination showed such to be the case. The bone almost protruded through the skin.
