TERRIBLE TOLL TAKEN BY THE BALKAN WAR

Male Population of Macedonia Reduced by Hundred and Thirty Thousand—Big Losses in Other Sections.

Sofia, Jan. 13.—A striking illustration of the terrible human waste of war is furnished by the census just taken of the new Bulgarian territories acquired by conquest. The male population remains out of a total of 42,500 in Bulgarian Thrace, only 22,000 males remain out of a total before the war of 49,000, while in the district of Mustapha Pasha, where fighting was so long and fierce, only 4,000 males are left out of 33,000, the total before fighting began.

BRINGING BODY OF HIS WIFE TO NOVA SCOTIA

Remains of Mrs. Brenton A. McNab, Wife of Montreal Newspaper Editor Will be Interred at Wallace, N. S.

Montreal, Jan. 13.—Brenton A. McNab, vice-president and editor of the Montreal Daily Mail, with the body of his wife, who died this morning, left on the Ocean Limited at 7.30 this morning for Wallace, N. S. The funeral will be held there on Thursday. Mrs. McNab was Catherine Helen MacQuarrie and was fifty years of age. She was taken ill January 4, while at her home in the Laurentian Mountains for the week-end and they returned to the city the same evening. Pneumonia developed next day. In spite of exceptional medical attention the disease made headway till Mrs. McNab lost consciousness at eight o'clock Monday evening. Death came at 2.30 Tuesday morning.
