Yarmouth, Feb. 15.—A meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held yesterday and the principal business which, came before them was the Hallfax-Yarmouth-St. John steamship service. Then a local concern—Hugh Cann and Sons, Limited—secured the subsidy and put on the steamer John L. Cann, which steamer has performed a very efficient service. The contract with the department of marine called for fortyround trips per year for which a gubsidy of \$10,000 was paid. So far she has made forty-two round trips and will likely make eight more before the year is up.

Whereas, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada has declared for the total suppression of the liquor traffic, and at the meeting Toronto, June, 1913, enacted as follows: "Resolved, that this Assembly is convinced that the time has arrived when Dominion and Provincial legislation should be secured for prohibiting the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes."

Therefore resolved, that this Association place itself on record as favoring a strong educational campaign throughout the province in favor of a provincial prohibition law vigorously enforced by the provincial government as being in the best interests of temperance, and such a campaign would receive our enthusiastic support.

A paper was read by Rev. J. J. McCaskill on the report of the Land Eequiry Committee of the British House of Commons.
