

FRANCE SHALL WIN, NEW WAR MINISTER SAYS

Mon. Millerand's first Official act a message of congratulation to Gen. Joffre and expression of Republic's Confidence.

Paris, Aug. 27, 4.05 p. m.—Alexandre Millerand, who became Minister of War in the new cabinet formed last night, today addressed the following letter to General Joffre, commander-in-chief of the French troops:

"My Dear General:
"On assuming control of the Ministry of War, I wish my first act to be to send to the troops under your command, and their chiefs, the tribute of the admiration and confidence of the government of the republic and the country. France is assured of victory, because it is resolved to gain it.
"Following your example, and that of your armies, France will maintain until the end, calm self control, with an earnest hope of success. Subjected to discipline, which is the law and strength of the armies, the whole nation, rising in defence of its soil and liberties, has accepted resolutely every ordeal, even the most cruel.
"Patient, tenacious and strong in its right, sure of its will, it will hold fast."

LLOYD GEORGE'S SON SAILS FROM N. Y. TO REJOIN COLORS

New York, Aug. 27.—The Baltic got away soon after one o'clock with 250 passengers and a cargo chiefly of foodstuffs.

Among the Baltic's passengers was Richard Lloyd George, son of the British Chancellor of the Exchequer, formerly in the British army, and now returning home to rejoin the colors. He came here from Cartagena, Colombia, where he was engaged in engineering work.

WHEAT FOR ENGLAND.

Carrying out 120,000 bushels of wheat and 400 tons of general cargo the Leyland liner Michigan sailed from her dock in East Boston on Tuesday for Liverpool. She carried no passengers. Of the 120,000 bushels of wheat 24,000 bushels consisted of wheat that had been intended for shipment on the S. S. America to Hamburg, Germany. The consignment was resold and taken aboard the liner of the America which is now tied up to her berth in South Boston with the S. S. Cincinnati.

C.P.R. DIRECTORS VOTE SUM OF \$100,000 TO THE PATRIOTIC FUND

Montreal, Aug. 27.—The directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway this morning voted \$100,000 to the Canadian National Patriotic Fund. It is thought the employees of the road will give a full day's pay, aggregating another \$100,000.

The Canada Sugar Refinery has voted \$10,000 to the fund.

Other contributions to the Patriotic Fund today were \$20,000 from the Imperial Tobacco Company, and \$10,000 from the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R. has requested every office and employe to donate to the patriotic fund one day's pay in September.

ENGLAND MORE CHEERFUL OVER YESTERDAY'S NEWS FROM SCENE OF ACTION

Reports from Land and Sea regarded as promising augury for future — Despatches vague and very often filled with discrepancies have kept people in dark concerning great struggle going on.

London, Aug. 27.—From both sea and land there came today official reports of a character considered in England to be a promising augury for the future.

The German trans-Atlantic liner Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse, at one time one of the most popular vessels of the North German Lloyd Line, sailing from New York, and one of the few German armed merchant men, which have been harrying Great Britain's trade routes, has been put out of commission. She was sunk off the African coast by the British cruiser High Flyer.

From the continent Field Marshal Sir John French, commander-in-chief of the British expeditionary force, has been able to set at rest much of the anxiety caused in England by the vagueness of French official statements regarding the movements of the armies in the locality where the British forces were known to be operating.

His despatch takes a rosy view of the prospects of the battle now in progress, and pays a tribute to the mettle of his French ally.

Much of the apprehension which has been felt in London can be traced to the rigid censorship maintained by the British authorities. Two million men have been grappling in a titanic struggle for days past, within a few hours' journey of London, yet so complete is the silence of those who are aware of what is going on, that the public knows practically nothing, except the bare fact that there have been reverses in some localities, and successes in others.

The purposeful vagueness of the French official announcements is further befogged by serious discrepancies in the various versions of the French statements.

At the present time these communications furnish the bulk of the news, as carried by the several news agencies, and no two versions of them agree.

The reference of the latest of these communications to the fighting on the Cambrai-Le-Cateau line, which was distinctly disquieting, now seems to have been nothing more serious than a cavalry raid, and an attempt to cut British communications, which was repulsed.

Nothing further has been heard from the Alsatian frontier, while the news of the Russian advance continues to come entirely from Russian sources.

The Moscovites claim to be within forty miles of Lemberg, Galicia.

The German steamer "Schneefels" that was seized by the British in the Mediterranean recently, carried a large consignment of tea for the Salada Tea Co. which was fortunately insured. The war risk paid was in the neighborhood of six cents per pound of tea. It is now anticipated that the "Schneefels" will be tied up at Gibraltar until the close of the war.

BRITISH WARSHIP SINKS GERMAN SHIP KAISER WILHELM DER GROSSE

London, Aug. 27.—Winston Spencer Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, announced the sinking of the Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse, in the House of Commons today. He said: "The Admiralty has just received intelligence that the German armed merchant cruiser Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse, of 14,000 tons, and armed with ten 4-inch guns, has been sunk by the H. M. S. High Flyer, off the West Coast of Africa."

"This is the vessel which has been interfering with traffic between this country and the Cape, and is one of the very few German armed auxiliary cruisers which succeeded in getting to sea. The survivors were landed before the vessel sank. The High Flyer had one killed and five wounded."

The official war information bureau announced this afternoon that the following message had been sent by the admiralty to the captain of the High Flyer:

"Bravo, you have rendered a service, not only to Great Britain, but to the peaceful commerce of the world. The German officers and men appear to have carried out their duties with humanity and restraint, and therefore are worthy of seamanlike consideration."

FORMER CHIEF JUSTICE IN YUKON, DEAD

Calixte A. Dugas dies in Montreal — For twenty years Police Magistrate

Montreal, Aug. 27.—Calliste Aime Dugas, former chief justice of the territorial court in the Yukon, died yesterday at St. Donat, County of Montcalm, where he was spending a holiday.

The judge's death came as a surprise to his numerous friends. The body was brought to the residence of the deceased's son-in-law, Mr. Louis Hierdt, 82 Durocher street, Montreal.

Mr. Dugas was born at St. Remi, Napierville, on February 11, 1845. He was appointed police magistrate of Montreal in 1878, a position which he held for twenty years.

FOR HOME AND COUNTRY VOLUNTEERS ARE REQUIRED

The 62nd Regiment, St. John Fusiliers, formerly on a peace footing, and lessened in strength by a large number of its members offering for Overseas Service, is now to be recruited

TO FULL WAR STRENGTH

At the present time instructions from Ottawa state that this enlistment is to be without cost to the public. This means that until later instructions are issued no pay will be allowed for any drilling that may be done. It is, however, anticipated that before long remuneration will be granted to those who may now volunteer for Home Defence, and that such remuneration will be at the rate of one dollar per day.

Such enlistment means:—
That in case of necessity the regiment may be called upon, or a certain portion of it may be called upon, for service in defence of Canada.

That in event of such a call, the men under arms will be remunerated at the rate mentioned above.

That under the existing military regulations, no person enlisting for militia service, or in home defence, can be ordered for foreign service, but will remain in Canada.

That those who now enlist for home defence and who may hereafter desire to offer for foreign service, will have the benefit of the training they may now receive and will thus be more acceptable than any who are lacking in such training.

That the duty of each member of the British Empire is to perform that which falls to his lot, and that at the present time such duty and such opportunity to serve is offered to all who may desire to enlist.

THE 62nd REGIMENT NEEDS 500 MEN These Are for Home Defence Only and May Not Be Compelled to Serve Overseas
