POLICE BOYCOTT IN IRELAND

Amazing Sinn Fein Document Taken from One of Trouble Makers.

A remarkable document formed part of the evidence at a general court-martial which was opened in Ship-street Barracks, Dublin, recently, when a man named William McNally, of Longford, was charged with having in his possession the following printed paper, the publication of which was likely to prejudice the Royal Irish Constabulary and the Dublin Metropolitan Police. It was as follows:

With a view to carrying into effect the Dull Decree of April 10, 1919, whereby it was decreed that the police forces maintained by the English Forces in Ireland be ostracized socially by the people of Ireland, you are requested to bring the following to the notice of all the members of your committee:

1. Avoid all intercourse with such persons, unless purely business matters made it absolutely necessary.

2. Do not salute them or reply to their salutations.

3. Do not take part in any social entertainment where they are expected to be present as guests.

4. Should they be allowed to attend any social entertainments, such as dances, etc., our members are advised to leave immediately.

Carefully avoid places they are known to visit, and more particularly public-houses which they frequent.

In the term police forces, we include all members of the organization known as the D. I. C. and D. M. P. Both officers and men ("peepers"), detectives and spies, whether they wear their uniform or not, and whether they are whole-time to detective and spying, or disguise themselves by engaging in some ordinary civil occupation. Members are requested to report to their officers any persons who are seen in social intercourse with them, and a
