Montreal, March 8.—At the special
meeting of the National Hockey
League held in the Windsor Hotel
here, this afternoon, the following
dates for the play-off for the cham-
pionship of the N. H. L. games were
assigned:

At Ottawa, March 10; at Toronto,
March 12, and if a third game is
necessary, at Hamilton, March 15.

Ottawa and Toronto are the respec-
tive champions of the National Hockey
League, first and second half ses-
sons.

Cooper, St. John's, will referee the
Ottawa-Toronto games. On the Pa-
cific coast, Mickey Long will referee.

Uniform rules were drawn up for
future Stanley cup games, to be used
in the east and the west.

The winners of the N. H. L. cham-
pionship will play in the Stanley cup
series against either Vancouver or
Seattle, starting on March 21.

WIDOW AWARDED \$50,000

Calgary, Alta., March 8.—The widow
of the late Dr. Chambers, of Calgary,
killed in the Canadian Pacific wreck
at North Bay, last year, was award-
ed \$50,000 damages against the Cana-
dian Pacific Railway by the appeal
court of Alberta yesterday. The widow
had sued for \$150,000, and the rail-
way had offered \$50,000.

REMANDED FOR TRIAL

Montreal, Que., March 8.—Gerald H.
Prnce, former junior partner in the
firm of Oswald Bros., stock brokers,
who went into voluntary liquidation a
short time, following Bruce's alleged
falsification of the books and theft
of approximately \$242,000, appeared be-
fore Chief Justice Decarie this morn-
ing in the court of sessions for volun-
tary statements, and at his own re-
quest was remanded for trial at the
next session of the Court of King's
Bench.

Wolfville, N. S., March 8.—The Tro-
jans of St. John lived fully up to their
title tonight when they defeated the
Acadia University basketball team by
a score of 31 to 11 in a clean and fast
played contest in the college "gym"
here before an interested group of
college boys, co-eds, Seminars and
townsfolk.

The first half was as pretty an ex-
hibition of the indoor sport as has been
seen in the Baptist College town for
some time. Clever combination play
was before hand, fast checking, and
both sides covered so well that the
score was a necessity choked badly.
Only 5 points being tallied by the
Trojans with the Acadians closely
following them up with 7 points to
their credit.

Battle Royal
When the two squads took the floor
for the final period a battle royal was
looked forward to, but the Trojans,
tried warriors of many a hard fought
game in the St. John City League,
opened a brilliant campaign that the
University team, for all their know-
ledge of the tactics, favored by Han-
ley and Cassie, were at loss to repel.
The St. John boys bombarded their
nets from every conceivable angle and
ran up an additional score of 22 points
while Acadia counted by adding four
points to their own score. The game
going to the Trojans by 31 points to
Acadia's 11.

Urbahart was the star on the Tro-
jan lineup and shared the shining
honors with Jimmie Flemming, a St.
John boy, the center of the Acadia
team.
