Interesting Exhibit
at the Library

TWELVE HUNDRED DOLLARS WORTH OF ETCHINGS SHOWN

An interesting and valuable exhibition of etchings by Canadian Artists opened at the Library this afternoon, when about one hundred examples of etchings and lithographs were offered for public inspection.

Fred S. Haines shows two splendid pieces of landscape "Spring" and "Fall Evening" (30) both pictures express delightfully their theme, a wonderful effect is obtained, with the avoidance of any details.

A Wood Engraving by Flo Sutherland entitled "Girl at Piano" is a masterpiece of interior work, the light effect from a window in the rear of the room being well attained.

Mr. W.J. Thompson's etching of "The Viaduct" is a splendid example

of perspective conveying a realistic height and depth effect.

"Evening on the Credit" a Mezzatint by E.L. Lam is another striking piece of work and is well deserving of notice.

The whole collection is proof that Canada is slowly but surely obtaining for herself a place equal to the European nations in Art.

The Canadian School is young yet, but is being built on a sure foundation, as the exhibition shows marked originality and imagination.

Miss Dunham is to be congratulated on the manner in which she has arranged the exhibit.

The permanent collection of local historic interests fit in well, making an interesting exhibition to art lovers that Kitchener has had for some time.

Entrance to the exhibition is by the side door in the basement where the Waterloo Historic Society have their permanent collection.

LIEUT. SCHMUCK GIVES HIGH PRAISE TO CITY OF METZ.

Mr. F.X. Schmuck of 108 Church Street has recently received word from his son Lieut. J.C. Schmuck who is at present with the American Army of Occupation.

One letter written from Luxembourg on January 14th gives a description of a visit to the city of Metz, the capital of Alsace, and Lieut. Schmuck pays high tribute to the city, and its inhabitants, cleanliness is characteristic of the town and people and food both at Metz and Luxembourg is plentiful.

The people treat the boys in a kindly manner and to quote Lieut. Schmuck's words "There are American Troops all through this part and they are leading the life of Riley, all sleeping on real beds and having the first good time since being in the army."

At one place Lieut. Schmuck was billeted with an old fashioned German farm lady and this was the means she prepared for him for the day.

Breakfast—Ham and eggs, toast, jam and coffee.

Dinner—Soup, Fish, Fried Spring Chicken, potatoes, pie and coffee and Lieut. Schmuck goes on to say "If anybody could want more than that I would like to see them. Only wish I could stay here a month at least. A number of interesting views of Metz were enclosed in Lieut. Schmuck's letter and they uphold what he has written as to it being a first class place. Lieut. Schmuck is doing an enormous amount of travelling over battle areas, and his letters are far more interesting than many a journalist who made the trip purposely to write about it."
