

SHORT DEBATE IN THE COMMONS AT OTTAWA.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Congratulated by Mr. Borden on Restored Health -The Alaska Boundary and the Redistribution Bill.

Ottawa, March 14.-The address in reply to the speech from the throne was carried at 10.30 o'clock last evening, after a debate of about five and a half hours, participated in by Lieut.—Col. Thompson, Haldimand, and Mr. Philippe Demers, St. John and Iberville, the mover and seconder; Mr. R. L. Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. F. D. Monk, Mr. John Charlton and Mr. Hehri Bourassa. The chief feature of the debate was the general note of congratulation to the Premier, who in his speech of upwards of an hour's duration gave convincing evidence of restoration to vigorous health.

The leader of the Opposition, who preceded him, paid a graceful compliment to the leader of the House, but Mr. F. D. Monk, the lieutenant of the Opposition leader, who followed, hore eloquent testimony to the convincing proof which the Premier had afforded the House of his convalescence. and asked for further information respecting subjects that had not been omitted.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied fully to the criticism, and dealt at some length with the Alaskan boundary commission, pointing out that Canada has surrendered nothing, while the United States has receded from the untenable position which resulted in the adjournment of the Joint High Commission. He also questioned the wisdom of some of the nominations made by the United States.

The Premier explained that the object in appointing a commission to re-

ject in appointing a commission to re-port on the subject of providing in-creased transportation facilities was to prepare a definite plan before calling upon Parliament and the country to as-sume further obligations. He intimat-ed that the Government would intro-duce the redistribution bill as a matduce the redistribution bill as a matter of duty rather than of choice, and emphasized the intention to perform that duty fairly, removing the existing abuses without creating new ones.

Dr. Desjardins, the newly-elected Liberal member for Terrebonne, was introduced amid applause from the Government benches by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Chas. Fitzpatrick.

AN UNLAWFUL ASSEMBLY.

AURORA INCIDENT THRASHED OUT IN COURT.

All the Accused Discharged-Magistrate Holds that two Persons Could be Proceeded Against-Mr. Munns' Remarks to the

Aurora, March 14.-The preliminary investigation into the charges against M. Fleury, W. Flicker, R. Linton, W. Wilson, Thomas Turon, T. Norton, Victor Bond, T. Horsley, Henry Alder and John Ough, of being members of an unlawful assembly on February 18 last, the night when the disturbance occurred at the meeting o Mr. Wm. Munns, who appeared as a Mr. Wm. Munns, who appeared as a Prohibition candidate in the recent bye-election in North York, was held here before Magistrate P. W. Ellis, H. H. Dewart, K.C., appeared for the prosecution, and T. C. Robinette, K.C., and A. E. Taylor of Aurora for all the defendants except Horsley, Bentl and Luran, woh were represented by Mr. T. H. Lennox. Mr. Lennox clients were the only three Conservates accused. All the charges were dismissed.

The first witness called was Mr. H. D. Lundy, who acted as Chairman at the meeting. He testified that he

the meeting. He testified that he thought Mr. Munns had received a fair hearing; better than he had had

on the previous night at Newmarket.
Mr. Wm. Munns gave a description
of the meeting. Upon the Chairman
leaving the chair he said there was a rush for the platform. He was shoved about and up against the wall. Sev-eral shook their fists at him, and threats were made. He was shoved off the platform, through the hall and into the street, where he was knocked down. On the way to the hotel he was knocked down several times. When he reached the hotel door someone jumpreached the hotel door someone jumped upon him and knocked him down the steps, and when he got up the same person had his back against the door to prevent his entering. Someone also threw something at him in the street. In the hall he had smelt a skunk odor, but he did not think anything with the odor on it was thrown at him until they were out in the street. The disturbance in the halls seemed to increase after the arrival of seemed to increase after the arrival of a load of people from Newmarket. He could not swear as to who were the ringleaders. Mr. Wells, the keeper of

the hotel, prevented them from attack-ing him in the hotel. Under cross-examination by Mr. Robinette, Mr. Munns' refused to state

who had brought him out as a can-didate. George Billings swore he saw Mr. Fleury in the hall egging Mr. Norton along when Norton called out "Rats." He saw the crowd rush upon the platform, and Mr. Flicker was one of them. He saw Flicker try to hit Munns. He also saw Flicker following Munns. Along the street. Munns along the street. He saw Flicker jump on Munns' back in front of the hotel and pull him down the

The Magistrate found no evidence against Bond and Horsley, and they were discharged, as were also Ough and Norton. He then dismissed all were discharged, as were also Ough and Norton. He then dismissed all the charges, upon the ground that there was no unlawful assembly; that if anything had occurred that should be a subject for punishment it would be only a matter of assault or disorderbe only a matter of assault of disorder-ly conduct. There was no doubt, he thought, that if Fleury were proceeded against for common assault the evi-dence would bear out the charge. In Flicker's case he thought there was evidence of a cowardly assault, and those cases would be summarily pro-ceeded with.

Mr. Munns was allowed to speak at the conclusion, and said that he had the conclusion, and said that he had no desire to prosecute anyone for assault. He had wished only to demonstrate that in a British country there should be British fair play. He had no hard feeling against any of the people of Aurora, and intended to come and see them again.
