WEALTH HAD DISAPPEARED.

A Rich Brazilian Planter's Death at New York.

New York, March 14.—Antonio Belens, a Brazilian, arrived at quarantine from Bahia on Wednesday's steamer. He was suffering from a fever, and died yesterday. A Belgian girl and two children, who are relatives of Belens, were taken to Ellis Island to-day, where the girl told the authorities that Belens was a rich planter, and that he carried a satchel containing several thousand dollars. The satchel and its contents, however, have mysteriously disappeared, and the authorities have found no trace of them. The girl said she expected to marry Belens.

Two Deserters Arrested.

Bellevue, March 13.—The police arrested two deserters from the Kingston Artillery here to-day, and they were this afternoon taken back to the Limestone City. Their names are William Hedges and Charles J. Swanson. The former has been absent from duty since last summer, and has been living in this vicinity all the time.

Lord Alverston, the Chief Justice of England, and two Canadian Judges will be the British Commissioners on the Alaska boundary.

The second reading of Mr. Taylor's bill for the repression of ritualistic practices was carried in the House of Commons by a majority of 61.

Albert Weing and Alf. D. Carroll were fined \$400 each and sentenced to a year's imprisonment at London for personation. They did not appear.

THE ADDRESS CARRIED.

A SHORT DEBATE IN THE COMMONS AT OTTAWA.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Congratulated by Mr. Borden on Restored Health—The Alaska Boundary and the Redistribution Bill.

Ottawa, March 14.—The address in reply to the speech from the throne was carried at 10.30 o'clock last evening, after a debate of about five and a half hours, participated in by Lieut.-Col. Thompson, Haldimand, and Mr. Philippe Demers, St. John and Ibberville, the mover and seconder; Mr. R. L. Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. F. D. Monk, Mr. John Charlton and Mr. Henri Bourassa. The chief feature of the debate was the general note of congratulation to the Premier, who in his speech of upwards of an hour's duration gave convincing evidence of restoration to vigorous health.

The leader of the Opposition, who preceded him, paid a graceful compliment to the leader of the House, but Mr. F. D. Monk, the lieutenant of the Opposition leader, who followed, bore eloquent testimony to the convincing proof which the Premier had afforded the House of his convalescence. Mr. Borden criticized the omissions which he found in the speech from the throne, and asked for further information respecting subjects that had not been omitted.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied fully to the criticism, and dealt at some length with the Alaska boundary commission, pointing out that Canada has surrendered nothing while the United States has receded from the untenable position which resulted in the adjournment of the Joint High Commission. He also questioned the wisdom of some of the nominations made by the United States.

The Premier explained that the object in appointing a commission to report on the subject of providing increased transportation facilities was to prepare a definite plan before calling upon Parliament and the country to assume further obligations. He intimated that the Government would introduce the redistribution bill as a matter of duty rather than of choice, and emphasized the intention to perform that duty fairly, removing the existing abuses without creating new ones.

Dr. Desjardins, the newly-elected Liberal member for Terrebonne, was introduced amid applause from the Government benches by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Chas. Fitzpatrick.

THE BURDICK MURDER.

Dr. Seth E. Paine and Mrs. Paine to Appear at Inquest.

Buffalo, N.Y., March 14.—Dr. Seth E. Paine and Mrs. Paine have been subpoenaed to appear at the Burdick inquest in Buffalo to-morrow.

A special to The News from Batavia says: Mrs. Seth Paine of Buffalo whose husband is a Batavia dentist, arrived in Batavia last night, and is now the guest of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Webster. Mrs. Paine was followed here by Detective Hoffman, it is believed that Mrs. Paine came here to consult Attorney Webster relative to her appearance at the Burdick inquest.

The will of the late Edwin L. Burdick, murdered in his home on Ashland avenue, Friday, February 27, was made public to-day. In his will Burdick left off his wife, whom he was suing for divorce, without a cent. He leaves \$2,300 to relatives, and the rest of his property to his three children, share and share alike. The will was made December 8, 1902. Mr. Burdick names Charles Parke and Risley Tucker, his business associates, as guardians of his three children. In the petition for probate no definite idea of the consequent valuation of Burdick's estate is given.

Buffalo, N.Y., March 14.—Yesterday the funerals of Attorney Arthur Pennell and Mrs. Carrie Lamb Pennell were held from the family home on Cleveland avenue. Aside from thirty members of the Erie County Bar Association named on Thursday to represent the association at the funeral the only persons present were the closest friends and relatives.

Seven Times a Murderer.

Lake Charles, La., March 13.—The second trial of A. E. Batson, charged with the murder of seven members of the Earl family near Welsh, La., has resulted in a verdict of guilty, and Batson will be for the second time sentenced to death.

Death of Margaret L. Shepherd.

Detroit, March 13.—Margaret L. Shepherd, alleged ex-nun and anti-Catholic lecturer, died at Harper Hospital March 3. She had been suffering with cancer, and died a few minutes after being taken from the operating table at the hospital.

Hawaiian Coins to be Melted.

San Francisco, March 13.—Sixty-five thousand dollars of Hawaiian money has been transferred from the United States sub-treasury to the local mint. This is the first consignment of Hawaiian coins to be melted and turned into United States money.

Their Profits Were Smaller.

Berlin, March 13.—The annual report of the Hamburg-American Steamship Company, made public to-day, shows the net profits to have been \$4,039,050, against \$4,638,630 for 1901. A dividend of 41-2 per cent. was declared, against six per cent. in the previous year.

Baron Toll's Expedition.

St. Petersburg, March 13.—Professor Bar Toll, the zoologist of the Baron Toll expedition, who left the expedition's yacht Zaria in May with three others to engage in scientific research in New Siberia, has arrived at Irkutsk, a city of eastern Siberia, 30 miles from Lake Baikal.
