The Committee have recoived promises from some of the best men in America to take part in the affair, and it will be the lead ing event in pedestrian circles this year. All of the Canadian "flyers" will be on hand, and some of the contests will be noteworthy. It will be conducted on the same principle as the great English handicaps which have so greatly assisted to make pedestriauism a feature of sport in that country.
