Madigan Killer Still Sought

PORT CREDIT — Detectives from Port Credit police and OPP Criminal Investigation Bureau are still tracing leads in connection with the strangling of Karen Madigan.

The 17-year-old Port Credit girl was found dead in her mother's apartment a week ago last Friday by the owner of the apartment building.

Since then police have been working round the clock trying to trace Karen's killer.

Detectives under Sergeant Bill Brooks of the local force and Inspector Peter Sedawatski of the OPP have interviewed several people.

So far none of the information gathered from them, nor clues left at the scene have lead to the arrest of the young girl's killer.

Public interest in the slaying seems to have died down but Port Credit police chief Doug Monro says his men will not be satisfied until they have caught Karen's killer. The chief denied reports that one suspect had been

given a lie detector test last week.

Chief Monro told the News, "Up to now we have no new developments but we are still working on the case. Detective Sergeant Brooks has been working with Inspector Sedawatski day and night some days but we still have not found the killer."

Ernie Martin Warden

BRAMPTON — Reeve Ernie Martin of Caledon was elected warden of Peel County Tuesday at county chambers.

He registered a fair majority over Reeve Charles Murray of Mississauga.

Mr. Martin, a relative newcomer to the county scene, was nominated by Reeve Cyril Clarke and Mayor William Brydon of Brampton seconded the nomination. Mr. Clarke spoke on Mr. Martin's behalf.

Mr. Murray was nominated by Mayor Robert Speck of Mississauga who spoke on his behalf.

All of Town of Mississauga's councillors attended, including Frank McKechnie, who was appointed to county council, Monday.

All other units within the county were also well represented.

Peel county encompasses the towns of Mississauga, Port Credit, Streetsville, Brampton and Bolton; and the townships of Caledon, Albion, Chinguacousy and Toronto-Gore.
