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Treatments of the Indians in General towards Norton except  
particulars set - but those that Gov. may depend upon dis-  
-posed him - Young Broad is a very fine young man &  
all I hope is that his West may not spoil him if he  
continues what he is he will be much respected -

I shall give the necessary orders for the returns of up per-  
-tains of every kind being made that I may report to you, but  
I am sorry to say I do not expect it will be attended to  
for we have so many heads that the Dept. becomes indif-  
-ferent, every officer has something to say, even the Commission-  
-ers their orders how the Indians shall be treated, indeed I  
feel myself, that I am used ill at that treatment continued  
again in the instance of that fellow Livingston, who was  
-dead some last summer merited his Dismissal instead  
of promotion and had not of not supporting me, the very  
great injustice done to the Dept. in favor of those there  
are many much more deserving of promotion and those  
in the Service are injured by this means being that even  
then, it was all well to give him a Step, but he had  
hardly got the Letter in my hand before he gets a Captaincy, mark  
my words, he will be a second Norton in this kind, a  
fellow notoriously known to have been in the Indian  
Country selling canoe loads of Indian presents of which  
the North West Company complained to the late Genl Norton  
and
