Dear Sir,

Referring to the case of Leon

Perelman about whom you wrote us on the 16th

December, 1921, and about whom we had some telephone
conversations recently (this case being dealt with on
your file No.11594/21 Nat), I may say that on the 3rd
instant we wrote to the Under Secretary of State for
External Affairs forwarding a copy of our letter to our
Agent at Antwerp. For your information I quote our
letter in full:-

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 24th ultimo, your file No. 525/ 22, in the case of one Leon Perelman now in Poland who was at one time resident in Canada and during his residence secured a Certificate of Naturalization here. Your letter now acknowledged is the first intimation we have had that Leon Perelman concealed his nationality during the war. We have a file of papers dealing with Mr. Perelman and on the 20th April last we wrote him addressing him at Warsaw and stating that if upon arrival at a Canadian port he satisfied the Immigration officer that his absence since 1914 was for a mere temporary purpose and that his return had been delayed by circumstances over which he had no control, he would be re-admitted. It is not.....
