

SECOND WITNESS cont'd

Prosecution He counted the cigarettes in the house & then the waiter and Pte Shellhorn went upstairs where Pte Shellhorn received approximately 5,000 Guilden for the cigarettes. We then went back to Scheveningen again. We arrived in Scheveningen about 12 O'clock, midnight. Pte Shellhorn told me to go to bed & see Sgt Perry or Mr Mycock in the morning & I said "No" I will see him to-night as I did not want the money on me. Pte Shellhorn was too tired to go with me to the "Monty's Hotel", so he went to bed. I waited up until 2 O'clock, (0200 hrs) when Sgt Perry and his wife came home. We went up to his room, & he then counted the money and gave me 800 Or 900 Guilden to split with Teddy Shellhorn, after that, I went home to bed.

The Accused declines to cross-examine this witness.

THIRD WITNESS
Prosecution

049708 Pte SHELLHORN Chester Theodore of 48th General Transport, Royal Canadian Army Service Corps. North West Europe Third Witness having been duly sworn states:-

I am 049708 Pte Shellhorn, Chester Theodore of 48th General Transport, Royal Canadian Army Service Corps North West Europe One afternoon in my room, about the first week in July/46, Pte Stoney came and asked me to go with him & sell some cigarettes, and asked me to use my truck. I asked him where he got the cigarettes, & where we had to go to get them, he said they were in Sgt Perry's room. I went for my truck in the vehicle park, picked up my work ticket on the way, Pte Stoney, Sgt Perry & myself then loaded the cigarettes on the truck, and started for Amsterdam. On the way to Amsterdam, Pte Stoney told me that there was 59,000# cigarettes. We sold 19,000 cigarettes when we got to Amsterdam, and as we could not sell the rest, we brought them back to Sgt Perry's room at the "Monty Hotel in Scheveningen. Sgt Perry was there, & Pte Stoney gave the money he had received for the cigarettes to Sgt Perry. I saw the money passed, but could not say how much there was. Sgt Perry told us, to come back in the morning for the cigs. We returned the next morning, Sgt Perry's girl friend was in the room she showed us where the cigarettes were, so we took them and loaded them on my truck, we went to Amsterdam first, then to Hilversum. We sold a few hundred there. Then we went to Nijmegen, where we sold the remainder of the cigarettes to a waiter in a cafe. We took the cigs to the waiter's home and unloaded them there We received the money for the cigs at the waiter's home. Then we returned to our billets here in Scheveningen. I went to bed & Pte Stoney went upstairs. It was approx midnight. ~~xxxx~~ I was not with him when he gave out the money that he had received for the cigs.

The Accused declines to cross-examine this witness.

FOURTH WITNESS
Prosecution

U1913 CSM SUTHERST Robert Steven, Special Investigation Section, Canadian Army Overseas. Having been duly sworn states:-

On 14 Sept 46 at approx 1200 hrs, I saw Mr Mycock at the Sgts Mess Canadian Wives Bureau, and I asked him to accompany me to Major Watt's office Canadian Wives Bureau, which he did. In the presence of Major Watts I told Mr Mycock I had reason to believe that he had 50,000 cigarettes at a private billet. He said "Of course not". I asked him if he had a private billet, other than his army address, and he said "No" I asked him if he had a room at the Montys Hotel, and he said no. I then told him that I was going to arrest him for authorizing the illegal disposal of 50,000 cigs. I then cautioned him, then asked him if he wished to make any reply, and he said "No"
