delegate to Ottowa the Ston Jung Rollson and the lake Ston Suft. Goul, ust aware, as this agrangement was not referred to, so far as! I know, when the question was before the Stouse. It seemed to me that there was little interest taken in the matter, as no one informed the Stouse of the necessity of securing water rights for the Indians and a local law was passed which gives them little owno securely, for the preservation of their water require ments even after a record has been made: Iwoole you on the 31 th ult, in regard to this matter, and it would be fortunate in the interest of the Endrans to leave that water rights within the railway helt are subject to the control and regulation of the government authorities. If otherwise, I should be glad to have your instructions as to the requisely payment of the fees for record to the Onef Commissioner of Lands and Works, and of the bells for advertising the requisite notices in the Gazette and heurspapers.
