It is pleasing to find an occasional frank and honest opinion on the Stratton scandal. Most of the Liberal mewspapers and all of the Liberal Legislative members are simply servile hidebound partisans who are willing to swallow any iniquity to save the party. But T. H. Race, editor of the Mitchell Recorder, Liberal, takes the Stratton scandal seriously, with the gravity of an honest man. He says in reference to the abuse being showered on Mr. Gamey by

some Liberal organs:

"To make Gamey out a questionable character, of no matter what degree, only makes those out still worse who had anything to do with him of a discreditable character. That there have been dealings with him of a disreputable character there can be little doubt. That there have been large sums of money involved in the transactions seems unquestionable from his story. That those who had directly to do with him were not handling their own money will be accepted by any and every reasonable man; and that they were not playing with such sums of money in such a manner as Gamey alleges without authority, goes without saying. Who was that authority?"

This is the way all honest Liberals are looking at the matter. If Gamey is not given a perfectly free chance to prove his charges the Ross Government admits its guilt.

"THE WITNESS" ON THE COM-

The Opposition has fought hard, as the Liberal Opposition did at the time of the Pacific scandal indictment, to have the charges heard before a committee of the House. They sought also, in any case, to have the whole ministry impeached, but the Government has succeeded by casting its own vote in having the charges confined to one minister. It is perhaps regrettable that Mr. Ross and his lieutenants should have found it necessary to vote at all in this connection, but considering that their abstention would have meant certain defeat, and probably another appeal to the country, they doubtless felt that they were fighting for their political present and It is not to be thought of that the judges will not do their duty faithfully, and the mere trial of this case must inevitably do much either to clear the air of imputations of bribery and corruption, or to confirm the same and prevent their repetition. The important matter is that the people should be seized of the whole case, and then pass judgment at the polls. It is hardly to be supposed that the whole nation will follow its political bell wethers on each side as sheepishly as its representatives in the Degislature are doing .- Montreal Witness, Liberal.

Crocodiles In Water.

The crocodiles are thoroughly aquatic in their habits, and their peculiar con formation enables them to attack and seize their prey unawares. Their nos trils, which lead by a long canal to the back part of their throats, their eyes and their ears are placed on the uppe part of the head, so that when in the water they can breathe, see and hear, while they are themselves practically invisible. When they dive, their nosvalves, and their eyes are covered by a transparent nictitating membrane. They are further furnished with an arrangement which prevents the water from getting down their own throats they are holding large animals under the water to drown them.

The dentition of these reptiles is pe-

culiar. The teeth are sharp and con ical and are hollow at the base, and each tooth serves as the sheath of an other, which will in time replace it. The tongue-for notwithstanding the ancient belief the crocodile does pos sess a tongue—is fleshy and is attached to the bottom of the mouth. And final ly the lower jaw is hinged at the very back of the skull, thus giving the animal its extraordinary gape and also the peculiar appearance which caused the notion that it moved its upper jaw.

Curious Fire Alarms.

In St. Petersburg the arrangement of fire alarms is rather neculiar and decidedly unique, and the fire alarm telegraph is an unknown thing. Instead a fireman is at all times in the tower of the city hall, and he watches the surrounding city to catch the first glimpse of a fire. When a fire is discovered during the day, he runs up black balls night red lanterns are used. The number of the balls or lanterns shows the district or ward in which the fire is located, says a writer on "Foreign Fire Fighters" in Cosmopolitan. as the signal is seen by the man on duty at the engine house he rings a bell outside, which calls together the members of the company, who may be scattered over a couple of blocks. This method is not conducive to quick time in reaching the scene, and from twenty minutes to half an hour is good work unless the fire happens to be near an engine house.
