CRICKET BY A HOUSE.—A young lad son of Mr. C. H. Howick, who has a great deal of met with an unfortunate accident on Saturday last. While harnessing his father's team one of the horses kicked him in the face, and the blow was so severe that a portion of his cheek, nose and lip were laid open in a shockingly manner. It is believed that the bones of his face had been seriously fractured. The services of the family physician were procured, and means were taken to relieve the little fellow of his sufferings were at once taken. We are happy to say that he is now progressing, and that nothing worse than a bad scar is likely to result from what came very nearly being a fatal blow.

CATTLE FAIR.—The cattle fair held in this town on Friday last was the best of the season, not only in regard to the number and quality of the animals offered for sale, but also the number of purchases and the prices paid. The cattle, mostly young, though generally in fair condition, were of but moderate size, and consequently high prices were not expected or paid; but the keen competition among buyers showed that the most market is not overstocked, and both seller and buyer seemed to be mutually satisfied with their bargains. The prices paid for steers and heifers ranged from \$15 to \$25. Among the principal buyers were Mr. Wilkinson of Guelpth, Robinson of Arr, Robb of Maryborough, Durand of Berlin, and King of Woodstock.

DEPRESSIVE ACCIDENT.—We are called upon to record another accident this week, and one of a very serious nature, which happened to a German laborer named John Klein, while working at Messrs. Bowman & Freir's new planing factory. The unfortunate man was engaged in running up bricks with a pulley to the top of the building. Having overloaded the box which conveyed them, one of the bricks accidentally tumbled out, when he was struck on the head, and when near the landing on upon the poor fellow's head, the sharp corners splitting the flesh openly three inches and fracturing the outside casing of the skull very badly. He was carried almost insensible into the Albion hotel, where the wound received skillful surgical treatment. In the course of a few hours he was removed to his home in Wallace. Though the accident is a critical one, there is strong hopes of his recovery. It is to be hoped that this accident will prove a warning to others not to venture beneath a heavy material while it is being raised to high position. Parties going up and down Main street during the construction of so many new buildings should also accept it as a caution to give these dangerous places as wide a berth as possible. Considering the present state of that thoroughfare the wonder is that accidents are not of frequent occurrence.

At the request of a number of Conservatives in Wallace, a public meeting of the electors has been arranged to take place at Little's School House to-morrow (Saturday) evening, at 7.30 o'clock. Several gentlemen from Listowel have consented to address the meeting on the issues before the country. A large representation of electors is requested.

Mr. Stevenson applied for a grant for the Elma and Wallace Agricultural Society, and the council adjourned until next meeting. Council adjourned, and held a meeting on the 7th day of September. All the members present. The minutes of former meeting read and adopted. The clerk was authorized to notify Messrs. McCormick and Grubler to have their fence on 28th and 29th removed to their proper places. Wm. Stewart was appointed collector for the current year at a salary of \$80 (said sum to cover all expenses). Mr. Lechead was authorized in connection with Grey to expend \$5 towards digging a ditch on boundary. A motion passed on the 1st inst. last, authorizing Mr. McCormick to expend \$40 upon Mr. Fisher's property, was rescinded. The council after going over the different clauses of Drainage By-laws and not being satisfied with them, the Reeve and Clerk were authorized to have legal advice on the same. The Reeve was authorized to take the necessary steps to send Mr. Gamble to Toronto General Hospital, provided the information applied for be favorable. The following orders were issued on the 7th: To R. L. Alexander, postage supplied to clerk, and telegram, \$8.50; To Hunter, \$4, filling gravel; treasurer, \$3.00 cents, discount on cheque for Improvement Fund money; to the Reeve, clerk and Assessor, \$4 each for making out jurors' list for 1878; a grant of \$100 was given to Elma & Wallace Agricultural Society, and \$20 to Elma. The council then adjourned to meet when called by the Reeve. T. FELLAROS, CLERK.
