

Tientsin, July 3.-Reports reaching here from Peking say that the Emperor has issued an edict appointing General Chang Hsun Premier and Viceroy of the province of Chihli and that he has named members of the new cabinet including \$952.80 Kang Yu-wei, president of the Progressive 169.35 party, to which millions of Chinamen belong, and Hsu Shih-Chang, former Secretary of State of China, who will head the 100.15 ministry. Gen. Chang Hsun sent four delegates to President Li Yuan-hung. to demand his resignation but the President paid no attention to them. The Manchus 43.53 have offered him a grand dukedom. It is reported that General Chang Hsun has forbidden the appearance of newspapers for three days. Liang Chi, the 58.50 famous reformer, declares General Chang 12.50 Hsun's coup suicidal and says it cannot 20.00 succeed. 62.50 "Hsuan Tung, the son of Prince Chun, ascended the throne of China on Decem-1.00 ber, 2, 1908, under the regency of his father. On December 6, 1911, Prince Chun abdicated as Regent, and on Febru-2.25 ary 12, 1912, the youthful Emperor abdi-3.78 cated the throne and the Chinese Republic 2.50 was established. Since that time the Em-7.00 peror had virtually been a prisoner of 31.00 Presidents Yuan and Li. In February of 0 this year it was reported that Hsuan Tung 20.25 would be brought to the United States to 3.50 complete his education, and it was said 7.48 that President Li had approved the plan for the Manchu Emperor to come to the 36.00 Junted States. Hsuan Tung was born in 50 1904. He first bore the title of Prince Pu-\$1,799.34 yi and took the name of Hsuan Tung E. S. POLLEYS, when he was enthroned as Emperor in Town Clerk. 1908.
