ST. LOUIS SAILS. NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—The American liner St. Louis sailed to-day for Liverpool with 148 cabin passengers, the largest number that has been carried by any ship of the international "mercantile" marines great fleet since the war began. The Minnesota sailed for London with 20 cabin passengers. There were no other sailings, although Saturday is regarded as one of the chief sailing days of the week. FOR THE SOLDIERS. WINNIPEG, Oct. 10.—The Manitoba Government has handed to Provincial Chapter, Daughters of the Empire, 500 flour sacks, being the surplus of those manufactured to contain Manitoba's gift to the empire of 50,000 sacks of flour. These sacks will be sold as souvenirs at about \$1 each, and the proceeds will be handed over to the St. John ambulance corps to provide comforts for soldiers at the front.

OCCUPY VILLAGE. LONDON, Oct. 10.—The correspondent of the Times at Constant reports that 5,000 Germans have occupied Courtrai, on the river Lys, 26 miles southwest of Ghent, and near the French border.

NOT TAKEN WITHOUT VERY GREAT LOSS Conflict Around Antwerp Has Been Terrible Phase of War.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] THE HAGUE, Oct. 10.—via London, 10 p.m.—Antwerp surrendered to the Germans at 2:30 p.m. Friday, October 9.

The war flag was removed from the cathedral and a white flag raised in its place at nine a.m. The actual surrender took place five and one half hours later.

It is declared here that the cathedral of Notre Dame has not been damaged.

The Germans delivered one of their last furious attacks between six and seven o'clock Friday morning. The Belgians resisted them valiantly in their trenches and the desperate fighting resulted in very heavy losses on both sides.

During all Friday night Zeppelin airships directed the firing of the German heavy artillery, the results of which were appalling.

The German artillery forced its way across the River Nethe in which many of the artillerymen were drowned. The fighting has been indescribably sanguinary.

The Belgians succeeded in blowing up two and possibly more of their batteries and heavy artillery.
