U.S. TROOPS FOR CUBA

Will Sail by the Mallory Line
Transport Str. Gussie.
7,000 SPRINGFIELD RIFLES,
A Lot of Ammunition and Hundreds of
Boxes of Provisions Will Be in the
Cargo—A Landing to Be Made
in Cuba Near Havana—
General War

Tampa, Fla., May 10.—The steamer
Gussie, one of the Mallory Line boats,
chartered by the Government for use as
a transport, will sail for Cuba to-mor-
row, loaded with arms, ammunition and
supplies, furnished by the United States
Government, for the use of the Cuban
army. A detachment of 100 United
States troops, the First Regiment of In-
fantry, will accompany the expedition,
and in guarding the landing of the
valuable cargo, and will, if necessary,
penetrate into the interior far enough
to place the supplies in the hands of
the Cuban forces. The expedition will be
in charge of Capt. W. H. Dorn, General
Miles' aide, who has just returned from
Cuba.

The Gussie has on board between six
and seven thousand Springfield rifles,
about 800,000 rounds of ammunition, and
several hundred boxes of provisions, con-
sisting principally of canned goods and
hard tack. The most serious concern
of the Cuban army is the maintenance
of the point of landing. The Cuban
troops, who are being transported, are
under the command of General Miles,
and will be landed at a point not far
from Havana. The Gussie had mounted
a gun on her forward deck, and it is
understood that it is understood, how-
ever, that she will be met at some
point not far from Key West by a
boat from the blockading squadron, and
conducted to the designated landing place.
The Whitney, the sister ship of the
Gussie, which sailed for Key West Sat-
urday with two companies of the
Fifth Infantry, returned yesterday. It is
implied that she will follow the
Gussie to Cuba as soon as the arms,
ammunition and supplies can be packed,
it is believed that the insurgent lead-
ers will have been furnished with
arms enough for at least 10,000 men,
and with bases of supplies established on
the Spanish forces will be unable to

QUEBEC LANDSLIDE

Buries Alive a 5-Year-Old Girl
at St. Thurbie.
IT WAS A WILD RACE WITH DEATH

Two Farmers and Their Families, with
the Above-Noted Exception, However,
Successfully Escaped With Their
Lives, But Lost All Their Posses-
sions—A Terrible and
Noisy Upheaval.
Quebec, May 10.—The usually quiet
village of St. Anne de la Paroisse,
famous for its landings of 1892 and 1893,
was again thrown into a wild state of
excitement yesterday morning by a tele-
phone message from St. Catharines that
another landslide had occurred at St.
Thurbie, a few miles away.
About four o'clock on Saturday morn-
ing the neighborhood of St. Thurbie was
startled by a low continuous rumbling
and tremor, which continued for some
time. The two houses occupied by the
farmers named Duval and T. Tessier,
and a school house, together on hearing
the noise, rushed to the top of the hill,
made good their escape, losing their
house, barns, etc., and completely
engulfed in the upheaval, and completely
lost to view. Poor Duval was not so
fortunate. He and his wife, with their
four children, started to flee from the
danger which was fast approaching their
home, the children crying bitterly and
hugged, the children clinging to their
parents, and clinging to their parents.
It was a wild race with death. The father
endeavored to carry one of the children
while the mother carried the others. The
turn of the landslide was awful, and
the prospect of a wild race with death
seemed to be awaiting them. They were
running as fast as they could, but their
drudgery was getting near and
nearer and it seemed the ground was
moving under them at every step.
Suddenly a sliding screen rent the
air and their five-year-old girl disappeared
from view almost under their very eyes.
It was not a moment before they were
ground with fatigue. Their happy home
was now completely buried, and the sun
lit in a topsy-turvy manner for over fifty
feet into the bowels of the earth, with
seventy voices crying out their five-year-
old daughter.
About sixteen acres in all slid away
down from the mainland in a snowslo-
pe, the tail of the snowsloping merging
into a small river, which was
swollen by the water from the landslide.
It is not expected that further
slides will take place, but nevertheless
the whole of the adjoining
neighborhood is in a state of
excitement and moving away from the vicinity. The
river being small and the water being
in no danger of a flood doing any damage.

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JULY WHEAT RISES 15 CENTS.

Phenomenal Gains at Other United States
Centers—British and Europe Also Re-
port Improvement—Quotations.
Monday Evening, May 9.
Wheat today continued its general
advance, and rose to 1.15 at Chicago,
and July at 1.20, both figures being
the highest since the beginning of the
year. The early strength of the market
at Chicago was caused by the heavy
demand for shorts and the further reports
of a European contract for a large
quantity of wheat. The advance in
the price of wheat was the result of the
shortage of wheat in the United States,
and the fact that the wheat crop in
the United States is not expected to be
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
