# X-RAY EFFECTS. Same Cause Produces Stimulation

# and Destruction.

It has been shown by experiments conducted in Germany by Dr. Schwartz that so far as their action or plain life and living tissue is concerned the X-ray have both a stimulating and a destructive effect, and results being controlled by the length of the exposure The proper time appeared to be 150 seconds, and shortly after expos-

ure to the rays the plants were so much stimulated that in three weeks time they had grown to double the height of the other specimens. Such experiments were made with

the use of young sprouts, and not up-on plants in an advanced state of growth. An exposure of 30 seconds has no appreciable effect of any kind upon the growth, and on the contrary, a long exposure of five minutes is seen to alter the tissues and hinder the growth of the plant.


As to the effect on the tissues of the human body, he found that in the case of wounds where there is a decrease in vitality of structure this is stimulated to quite a degree, so that, for in stance, an obstinate wound will heal up after a few days. It is well known that the X-rays will produce severe burns upon the skin, but this is caused by a too strong action.




