The Ottawa Valley is a veritable storehouse of power. The Rideau, Livere and Gatineau Rivers, the Chats Falls, Dechenes Rapids and the Chaudiere Falls are destined to make Ottawa the centre of a vast supply of electrical energy when all these water powers are fu ly developed.

A Fifty-Mile Horizon.

One can stand at the window of the Toronto City Hall tower, and on a bright day the circling horizon will outline the dwelling place of 637,250 people. This is one-ninth of the population of Canada, nearly one-third of the population of the populous and prosperous Province of Ontario.
