Visited the Indians In the Frozen

North In the Sixties. One of the makers of history in Northwestern Canada is now spending the evening of his days in Winnipeg at his modest residence, 57 Macdonald street, venerated by those who know him and his life's history. His active years were chiefly spent near and within the Arctic Circle, the Yukon, the Klondike, and other districts whose names gold has since made familiar to the world, which were traversed by him in the long ago.

He was ordained deacon in Decen ago.

He was ordained deacon in December, 1852, and priest in 1858. He was first stationed as Church Missionary Society missionary at Islington, Winnipeg River. In 1862 he was selected to establish a mission at Fort Aux Liards, Mackenzie River District, but he proceeded instead to Fort Yukon. In 1871 he removed to Porcupine River, and in the next year to Peel River, where he labored until 1904.

Proceeding in 1862 from what was then called the Red River Settlement to Fort Yukon, Archdeacon McDonald labored there among the Indians, who were composed of numerous tribes, and who annually assembled in the summer at that port for the purpose of fur-trading with the Hudson Bay Co. During his stay there of eight years, the Indians in the surrounding country were visited, both in winter and in summer.

Thousands of miles were traversed annually, either in canoe or boat in summer, and on anowshoes in winter


