BISHOP IS

Details Of His Alleged Attack On Conductor Bechard

Prisoner May Come Up On Charge of Using Bad Language

Judge Houston's Court was crowd-

ed yesterday morning, when the case against Bruce Bishop, charged with obstructing a C. W. & L. E. conductor while the latter was on duty, came up. Bishop was dismissed with a severe reprimand on this charge, but it is likely that he may come up later on a charge of using imup later on a charge of using improper language in a public place. The testimony of Conductor Bechard, the complainant was to the effect that on the evening of July 12 Bishop got on his car on King street. He further told the prisoner that there were four other cars going out, and that if he-Bishop-didn't like the accommodation he was getting he could have his money back, and take another car, whereupon Bishop commenced to swear and abuse the road. Bechard says that he again offered him his money back, and told him if he had any complaint to make to go to the C. W. & L. E. offices and make it. After the Aberdeen bridge was crossed, Bishop commenced swearing again. Bechard told him that he would have to get off the car. Bishop replied Bechard told bim that he would have to get off the car. Hishop replied that he wouldn't get off. 'I have heard enough from you," said Bishop and Bechard says he grabbed him by the threat and one ear.
