Five witnesses were examined, Frederick Seifter, Simon Gibritski, H. Bird, P. Dezelia and Philip Smath, a bartender at the Tecumseh House, where Futeral put up while in Chatham.

He connected himself, his father, Futeral and Kovinskic with the affair, and the story created a favorable impression on the Judge who was inclined to believe it. T. C. Rob.nette, who acted as counsel for Mr. Stanworth, who was defending the accused man, made an eloquent address to the jury, and it evidently had its effect. Mr. Elliof, for the Crown, also made an address to the jury, after which the Judge charged strongly in favor of a conviction.

The judge told the jury that they had taken a remarkably merciful view of the case in discharging the prisoner, and he said that had he been trying the wase, the verdict would have been different, as he would have given the accused man as long a term in prison as he could, as he considered the offense of receiving stolen goods worse than that of stealing them. In discharging him, he advised him, in view of the uncomfortable time he had had in the jail, and the narrow escape from punishment, to conduct himself in the future in such a manner that he would be above suspicion.
