THE WINTER was severe. Three months of excellent sleighing—several storms, old-fashioned, wild—a few soft spells, and a good deal of hard frost, and you have the outline.

CROP ROUND. The food sometimes becomes bound and impacted in the crop. Make an incision into the crop and carefully remove the contents with a blunt instrument, close with a stitch, and feed soft food for two or three days in which a little gentian and cayenne pepper is mixed.

GAFES is caused by parasitic worms in the windpipe occurring in chickens up to two or three months of age, exposed to wet and filth. Separate the chicks affected; dip a feather, stripped to within half an inch of the end, in spirits of turpentine, and pass it down the windpipe at the base of the tongue.

CHOLERA. This disease first makes its appearance in the urate, giving them a yellowish cast. These discharges, as the disease advances, gradually become more frequent and copious. The bird becomes very weak, sometimes living several days, but often dying in 24 hours.

These little pests, which luxuriate in dirt and filth, are of two kinds, the larger one called body lice and the little red spider lice. The former live on the fowls' body, but it provided with a proper dust-bath, hens will usually rid themselves of them.

Willow Bank Cemetery. The eighth annual meeting of the trustees and lot owners of the Willow Bank Cemetery corporation was held in Witter's Hall, Wolfville, on Wednesday evening, April 6th. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The first business of the meeting was the election of the trustees to fill the vacancy caused by the retiring of the three senior members of the board. The by-law requiring a ballot being suspended by vote of the meeting, the three retired members, viz, Prof. J. F. Tufts, J. E. Eagles, and Avard J. Woodman, were unanimously re-elected. The report of the trustees was read and adopted: Report of the Trustees of the Willow Bank Cemetery Corporation for the year ending March 31st, 1887: The Cemetery grounds have been improved by the planting of a large number of trees; some repairs have been made on roads, bridges and fences; all under the supervision of the committee on improvements, the whole expense of which amounts to forty-two dollars and seventy-five cents (\$42.75). The whole number of lots sold and otherwise disposed of up to the commencement of the year just ended were thirty-eight, half lots two, on which there was a balance due the corporation of \$183.95; collected during the year on account of this, in work \$24.88, cash \$150.00—\$40.88. Balance still due on the above—\$134.07. There have been sold during the said year: Lot No. 108, to Wm C. Blackadder, 128 feet, for \$8.54; Lot No. 111, to Vernon Griffin, 225 feet, for \$15.00; Lot No. 114, to Alexander Forsyth, 225 feet, for \$15; Lot No. 106, to Mrs Joseph Weston, 120 feet, for \$8.00. Collected on account of this, \$46.54; in work \$4.50, cash \$15.00—\$19.50. Whole amount due on lots, \$161.11. Cash received during the year: From Mr Freeman on account of Lot 112, \$10; from C. E. Burgess in full on account of Lot 105, \$15; from Vernon Griffin on account of Lot 111, \$15; Balance on hand April 1st 1886, \$7.97. Total—\$47.97. Cash paid out during the year:
