Many Earthquakes
Felt Further West

Severe Disturbances in Bed of Pacific Are Recorded at Victoria, B.C.

Victoria, B.C., June 28.—Earthquake shocks of several hours' duration have been recorded on the seismograph at the Dominion Meteorological office, Victoria, lately. The disturbances were apparently submarine, in mid-Pacific. Two of the shocks were of such duration that they would be recorded at all the meteorological stations throughout the world. The first disturbances that were recorded here occurred on Sunday, June 23, and originated in the vicinity of the Aleutian Islands where the big volcanic eruption occurred in June last year. The second shock was recorded at 7 a.m. on Wednesday, June 25.

The worst disturbance took place at 9.53 p.m. the same date, when another world-shaking earthquake was recorded by the seismograph.

President Ismay
Retires Today

Man of "White Star" Fame is Succeeded by Harold Sanderson

London, June 30.—The resignation of J. Bruce Ismay as president of the International Mercantile Marine Company, sometimes known as the "American Shipping Trust," became effective today. Mr. Ismay is succeeded by Harold Sanderson, who has been with the company since its formation. The company controls the White Star, Red Star, Atlantic Transport, and the Dominion and American lines.

MILITARY NOTINGS

The 99th Man. Rangers entrained for Sewell Camp at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. The regiment turned out about 90 strong, exclusive of the officers. At 8.30 a.m., the men fell in at the armory, and after going through a few evolutions, marched, with their band playing inspiring airs, to the C.P.R. depot.

A big crowd assembled along the route of march and many were the complimentary remarks heard about the soldierly bearing of the men. WHY WOLSELEY WENT
TO THE RED RIVER

An Incident in Canadian History Which is Interesting to Recall

To understand the conditions which made it necessary for the late Field Marshal the Viscount Wolseley to go to the Red River at the head of a military expedition in 1870, one must go back to the early days of Confederation.

At the first Parliament of the Dominion of Canada (1867) attention was directed towards the extension of the Dominion westward to the shores of the Pacific Ocean, and steps were taken to secure the transfer from the Hudson's Bay Company to Canada of Rupert's Land and the North-west Territory.

An address to Her Majesty Queen Victoria was adopted requesting that an Imperial Order-in-Council might be passed (pursuant to the B.N.A. Act) annexing these vast territories to the Dominion of Canada. But the Imperial Government decided that the Company must first be bought out. For this purpose the Hon. George E. Cartier and the Hon. Wm. Macdougall visited England in 1868. Early in 1869 the bargain was completed, the sum of \$1,500,000 being agreed upon as the purchase price. By the terms of the bargain, the Company was to retain the land and the various trading posts, and, in addition, two sections in every township of the entire region. For this cash payment and large land monopoly the Company agreed to give up its trade monopoly and all its claims to government. Canada at once made preparations for the government of the new territory. A Lieutenant-Governor and a small Council were appointed to administer its affairs until a more permanent form of government could be arranged. The Hon. Wm. Macdougall was selected to fill the position of Lieutenant-Governor, and in the autumn of 1869 he started for Fort Garry, intending to enter upon his duties on Dec. 1. On Oct. 30, he reached Pembina.

A startling surprise awaited him. A half-breed served upon him a notice, which had been drawn up by Louis Riel, forbidding his entry into the territory. This notice was the result of the failure of the officials of the Hudson's Bay Company resident in England to consult the officials (factors and traders) resident in Canada. Some time before this the Company had been re-organized, and the officials resident in Canada had been made, in a sense, partners in the concern. Their incomes depended on the amount of business done. When the bargain was made in London for the transfer of the Company's property in Canada to the Canadian Government, they were not consulted. They were to receive no part of the purchase money, and the giving up of the Company's monopoly meant, of course, a serious loss to them. The settlers, too, thought that Canada should have consulted them in reference to the nature of the government to be established in the colony; and that, in particular, the claims of the half-breeds, both French and English, to the lands over which they hunted, should have been settled before the transfer took place.

The half-breeds, therefore, becoming alarmed about the title to their lands, formed a "council" to insist upon their rights. It was this Council that approved of the notice served upon the Hon. Wm. Macdougall. This notice was disregarded by Macdougall who advanced to the Hudson's Bay Company's post within the Territory.

A band of mounted half-breeds appeared and made such a demonstration that Macdougall thought it prudent to go back to Pembina. On Nov. 2 a party under Riel took possession, without resistance, of Fort Garry. On Dec. 1 a "provisional government" was formed, of which Riel shortly afterwards became president. Then followed the refusal of the Canadian Government to pay over the £300,000 to the Hudson's Bay Company, until order had been restored, the return of Macdougall to Ottawa, the attempt of Vice-General Thibault, Col. de Salaberry and Donald A. Smith (now Lord Strathcona) to restore amity and concord, the convening of another convention and the drawing up of a "Bill of Rights," the Kildonan uprising, the threat of Riel to shoot Major Boulton, and the murder of Thomas Scott, against whom, it is said, Riel had a personal grudge.

Aroused indignation

In Canada (that is, in the original four Provinces) the news of this cold-blooded murder caused the greatest indignation and excitement, and preparations for a military expedition to the Red River were pushed rapidly forward. In the summer of 1870 a force of about 1,400 (of whom less than 400 were British regulars) under the command of Colonel Wolseley, proceeded to the Kaministiquia River on Lake Superior. Thence, by a long and fatiguing journey, partly by canoe and partly on foot, the soldiers proceeded over the height of land to the shores of Lake Winnipeg. Ascending the Red River, they reached Fort Garry over the end of August. No amity had been predicated, and for a time threats had been made that resistance would be offered to the advancing troops by the French half-breeds. No steps, however, were taken to carry out these threats, and on Wolseley's approach, Riel and his lieutenants, Leppie and O'Donoghue, fled to the United States. Days of peace and tranquillity followed. Within a week after their arrival at Fort Garry the regular troops had been sent back to Quebec. The militia battalions, however, spent the winter in the Province and many of the soldiers afterwards became settlers. The early days of 1871 saw the Province of Manitoba airily launched on her career.
